Daniel "Dan" Applegate died at the Hays Medical Center on June 11, 2010, at the age of 73. Dan was born on December 14, 1936 on a farm in Norton County. He was the oldest of four children of Lester and Leita Applegate.

Dan grew up attending various schools in Norton, Osborne and Graham Counties. He graduated from Hill City High School in 1954 and attended Manhattan Christian College for two years and graduated from Fort Hays State University with a degree in Elementary Education as well as a Master's Degree in Administration. After teaching school for one year in Bogue, he married Sarah Lowry on August 22, 1958 in Grand Rapids, Mich. They made their home in Hill City while teaching two years at a country school in Densmore and then six years in Morland.

In 1966, they moved to Monument and he began teaching at Oakley-Monument USD 274 where he remained for 32 years. They had two children while living in Monument, Gina Lucille and Joel Daniel. After living in Monument for eight years, they purchased a home in Oakley in 1974. Gina and Joel continued to attend elementary school in Monument and Dan had the pleasure of teaching both of them in the 5th grade. Dan retired in 1998, after teaching 41 years in Kansas schools.

Dan was a faithful member of the Oakley Christian Church and held offices as Deacon and Elder. He was involved in teaching Sunday School for many years and attended the local Promise

Keepers breakfast until a couple of years ago.

Dan enjoyed working for various farmers during the summer months and mowing lawns with the family. He also enjoyed gardening. During the winter, he would clean the snow for his neighbors. He mowed and removed snow until Parkinson's set in.

Dan was a wonderful husband and father. He was a man of integrity, gentle and transparent. He had no greater joy than when he was able to be with family and friends.

Dan was preceded in death by parents Lester and Leita Applegate.

Survivors include his wife Sarah; son Joel Applegate and wife Korlynn of Beloit; daughter, Gina Applegate-Shutts of Salina; brothers, Richard Applegate and wife Ida of Florissant, Mo., Leroy Applegate and wife Monnie of Tucson, Ariz.; sister, Vicky Fox and husband Dwight of Pahrump, Nev. and 5 grandchildren, Graham, Whitney, Pierce and Mallory Applegate and Couper Shutts.

Weddings create lasting memories

My cousin Margaret is finally getting married. Frankly, I've been a little worried about this for awhile. After all, she is almost 24 years old and I figured she was well on her way to being an old maid school teacher. I'm only 13 and my dad is already worried about getting me launched in life, which to him, means married.

Tuesday, June 15, 2010

Mama and Aunt Florence and I are in the basement at the Methodist Church helping everyone get dressed. We all have new dresses for the occasion made of the very newest fabric, crinkled nylon. It looked so thin and cool on the hangers; who knew it would be so warm?

This is the first time I've helped at a wedding and I had no idea it could be such a hectic affair. So far everything that can go awry, has done so. The bride is standing on a table in the kindergarten room while her mother whip stitches the hem of her beautiful white wedding gown, which got stepped on in all the confusion. Every two minutes Maggie says "Is George here yet?" and everyone assures her he is. He isn't and right now no one knows why. The flowers



haven't arrived and no one knows about those either.

Cousin Barbara, the matron of honor, is fighting morning sickness. Her mother is fussing with her pink taffeta dress and stole, vainly attempting to disguise the fact that she is "expecting."

Uncle Jim, who customarily wears overalls for every occasion, is in the kitchen struggling into his only suit. Apparently he is not quite as lean as he was when he last wore the suit, 10 or 12 years back and cannot button the pants. Mama and Florence dig through drawers and cabinets frantically searching for a safety pin but have to settle for a jerry rigged arrangement of rubber bands looped through the buttonhole and over the button. They stand him in a corner and tell him to hold his breath. He puts his false teeth in, leans against the wall and sighs.

Flowers arrive but no George. to cover baby. The organist launches into her entire repertoire for the second time. Twelve minutes past two and no groom. The minister is pacing. The best man comes downstairs and inquires if George is down here. Unfortunately Maggie overhears. Tears.

Twenty seven minutes past two, with Margaret near hysterics, George's car screeches up out front and he comes tearing down the stairs. "I left the rings home on the dresser in Hoxie so I had to go get them," George explains. Did he mention to anyone that he had to drive 20 miles to Hoxie where home and the dresser were? Of course not.

Above the soloist begins "O Promise Me" and the wedding party hastily ascends the steps to line up in the narthex. Mama and I slip down the side aisle to join Dad and turn to watch as Aunt Florence is escorted in, only slightly frazzled, followed by George's mother and her escort. George, his brother and the minister appear at the altar. Here comes Barbara, looking downright regal and elegant, bouquet artfully arranged

With a relieved flourish the organist hits the opening chords of the wedding march. Margaret is an enchanting bride, dark hair glowing beneath her white veil. big brown eyes sparkling and a smile as wide as all outdoors. Beside her is Uncle Jim, dentures in place, jacket snugly buttoned to hide his makeshift belt, looking distinguished, if unusually erect.

Almost before I can draw a long breath the service is drawing to a close. Mama and I slip out and dash downstairs to fill the punch bowl and set out mints and nuts. An iced tower of cake, flanked by tall pink candles centers a table draped with Grandma Cafferty's Irish linen tablecloth. Descending guests cluster in chattering groups until the wedding party troops down, duly photographed and smiling. Cake and punch for all after the bride and groom cut the first slice.

Uncle Jim heads straight for the rest room and returns in his overalls, teeth tucked in the front pocket where they usually dwell, breathing again. And all's well that ends well.
