Council discusses inmate crew

Norton County and the City of Norton have agreed on the terms to have the Norton Correctional Facility inmate work crew start in July.

Jeff Otter reported the city and county have signed an inter-local agreement and agreed verbally that the county would administer the program for the first three months while the old Emergency Medical Services building is remodeled.

"We agreed the county would administer the program for the first three months," Otter said.

The building will be used for county storage and will house the inmate crew during working hours.

Otter said they also discussed the hiring committee for the Department of Corrections officer who will be hired to supervise the crew.

"We looked at having Rob (Lawson) and Robert Wyatt on the selection committee for the corrections employee," Otter said.

Otter made a motion to have the city administrator serve on the hiring committee. Vote taken, motion passed.

In other council business:

• Mayor David Corns appointed Justina Smith to fill the Ward III seat, vacated by Joe Leroux.

"She was one of the candidates who ran in the last election. I would ask for a motion to appoint her," the mayor said.

A motion was made to accept Justina Smith as the Ward III representative. Vote taken, motion passed.

Smith thanked the council for their vote. She will serve as chairperson of the utility committee, vice chairperson on the public works committee and will (**Council** - Continued on Page 5)

Fund-raising still needed for Wall

Fundraising for the Vietnam Moving Wall will continue through the summer with several fundraisers planned in the coming months.

Carol Erlenbusch, Norton County Arts Council chairperson, said \$5,000 has been raised, but more donations are needed. It will take \$10,000 to \$15,000 to bring the wall to Norton.

She said any extra funds will be used to build a permanent veteran's memorial in Norton, but plans have not been finalized.

'We would like to put a veteran's memorial in Norton with any extra funds," she said.

The wall will be here from Sept. 23–27 and will be located on the east side of Prairie Land Electric on Highway 36.
