Most farm equipment is not designed to travel at highway designed to travel at highway
speeds, and may only be designed to travel $15-25 \mathrm{mph}$.
Farm equipment is often wider
than other vehicles, times wider than the lane of traf fic, so extra room should be allowed when traveling near a farm implement on the road.
Extra caution should be practiced on all roads, but especially on the busy rural roads with un-
marked intersections. marked intersections.
Two years ago in the state of
Kansas, 109 crashes involved farm equipment.
Two people were killed, and 42 injured. In the 10 years from 1998 to 2008, a total of 1,351 crashes involved farm implements and other vehicles.

Here are some safety Here are some safety tips to
keep in mind when sharing road with farmers: - Don't as
knows you're there. Most operators of farm equipment regularly check for vehicles behind them, however most of their time must be spent looking ahead to keep the equipment safely on the road and to watch for oncoming traf-
fic. Farm vehicles are extremely fic. Farm vehicles are extremely loud, often hindering the farmer'
ability to hear your vehicle. $\bullet$ Pass with extreme caution not pass a farm implementunless not pass a farm implement unless you can see clearly ahead of both ment you are passing. If there are any cur blocking your view of oncoming traffic, wait to pass until you can clearly visualize the area you're passing in. Another important
hing to remember is you should not pass in a designated "No
Passing Zone," even if you are Passing Zone," even if you are
stuck behind a farm vehicle. Do not pass if you are within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevated structure or tunnel.

- Allow extra room when fol-
owing farm equipment. With slow moving vehicles, a passenger vehicle can close in on the empty space much more quickly than you close in on a regular ve-
hicle. Just because a farm vehicle pulls to the right side of the road does not mean it is turning right or allowing you to pass. Due to the size of some farm equipment, the farmer must execute wide left turns, so when folt plenty of room and time to turn, and be alert to the surroundings to
see if there might be a driveway or
field they are turning into.
- Be patient. Don't assume - Be patient. Don't assume a
farmer can move aside to let you pass. Shoulders may be soft, wet pass. Shoulders may be soft, wet orsteep, which can cause the farm not support the weight of a heavy farm vehicle.
The farmer understands you are being delayed and he or she will move over for you to pass at the irst safe location available. - Think of the slow moving ehicle emblem a
adjust your speed.
When you see the slow moving vehicle emblem, you should immediately slow down. While the emblems are visible from a long
to judge the speed at which you are closing in on a vehicle, especially at night. - Pay attention. Don't allow yourself to be distracted by the radio, cell phones, other electronic devices or anything else while you are driving. When you are not focused on the road, you increase your chances of a collision, especially if you should come upon a slow moving farm vehicle.
