
### Sink or swim

## Norton school district discusses state tests

ebradley@nwkansas.com Each school made Annual Yearly Progress, but Norton Community Schools did not since too many special education students were allowed to take the Kansas Assessment of Modified Measures, an alternate form of the state assessment.

During the June 14 Norton Community Schools board of education meeting, Superintendent Greg Mann said the district did not meet Annual Yearly

In an interview after the meeting, Mann said the district will not have any new rules or regulations for next year.

"Whether it is the district or a building not making AYP, we must miss AYP two years in a row for there to be sanctions," he said.

We will have to do a better job of (a) determining who is to be allowed to take the test and (b) communicating between the buildings as to how many KAMM tests are being considered to be given," he said.

# Practice caution when driving during harvest

The wheat is turning golden and the harvest season is set to begin.

Now's an important time for drivers to exercise extra caution and patience when operating a motor vehicle around farm trucks, tractors, and combines.

Every year the Kansas Highway Patrol and local law enforcement agencies investigate numerous crashes between passenger vehicles and farm vehicles, many of which could have been prevented.

"Sharing the road with farm implements requires different precautions than sharing the road with passenger vehicles," said Patrol Superintendent Col. Terry Maple.

"The time, space, and differences in vehicle operations need to be understood in order for our farmers to be kept safe, as well as other motorists."

Most farm equipment is not designed to travel at highway speeds, and may only be designed to travel 15-25 mph.

Farm equipment is often wider than other vehicles, and sometimes wider than the lane of traffic, so extra room should be allowed when traveling near a farm implement on the road.

Extra caution should be prac-

ticed on all roads, but especially

on the busy rural roads with unmarked intersections. Two years ago in the state of Kansas, 109 crashes involved

farm equipment. Two people were killed, and 42 injured. In the 10 years from 1998 to 2008, a total of 1,351 crashes involved farm implements and

other vehicles. In the 10 year time frame, 48 people were killed, and 493 injured in those crashes.

Here are some safety tips to keep in mind when sharing roads with farmers:

• Don't assume the farmer knows you're there. Most operators of farm equipment regularly check for vehicles behind them, however most of their time must be spent looking ahead to keep the equipment safely on the road and to watch for oncoming traffic. Farm vehicles are extremely loud, often hindering the farmer's ability to hear your vehicle.

• Pass with extreme caution. Do not pass a farm implement unless you can see clearly ahead of both your vehicle and the farm equipment you are passing.

If there are any curves or hills blocking your view of oncoming traffic, wait to pass until you can clearly visualize the area you're passing in. Another important

thing to remember is you should not pass in a designated "No Passing Zone," even if you are stuck behind a farm vehicle. Do not pass if you are within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevated structure or tunnel.

• Allow extra room when following farm equipment. With slow moving vehicles, a passenger vehicle can close in on the empty space much more quickly than you close in on a regular vehicle. Just because a farm vehicle pulls to the right side of the road does not mean it is turning right or allowing you to pass.

Due to the size of some farm equipment, the farmer must execute wide left turns, so when following a farm implement, allow it plenty of room and time to turn, and be alert to the surroundings to see if there might be a driveway or field they are turning into.

• Be patient. Don't assume a farmer can move aside to let you pass. Shoulders may be soft, wet or steep, which can cause the farm vehicle to tip, or the shoulder may not support the weight of a heavy farm vehicle.

The farmer understands you are being delayed and he or she will move over for you to pass at the first safe location available.

• Think of the slow moving vehicle emblem as a warning to adjust your speed.

When you see the slow moving vehicle emblem, you should immediately slow down. While the emblems are visible from a long

distance away, it is often difficult to judge the speed at which you are closing in on a vehicle, especially at night. • Pay attention. Don't allow

yourself to be distracted by the radio, cell phones, other electronic devices or anything else while you are driving.

When you are not focused on the road, you increase your chances of a collision, especially if you should come upon a slow moving farm vehicle.

• Always wear seatbelts and use child safety seats. This is the best defense against injury and death should you be involved in a motor vehicle crash.

Did you know Kansas ranks higher than the national average for underage drinking in surveys of 8th, 10th and 12th graders? Youth under the age of 21 account for 25% of all

admissions for alcohol abuse. It is estimated underage drinking cost Kansas citizens \$727 million in 2007. In FY09 treatment of alcohol abuse for underage persons cost Kansas over \$1.4 million. 29.2% of 10th graders and 42.4% of 12th graders report alcohol is easy to get.

KSA 41-3610 makes it unlawful to host or allow minors access to alcohol with punishment of up to \$2,500 in fines and 1 year in jail. The social hosting law also makes you liable for minors accessing alcohol at your residence even without you being present.
