Leo Jacob Stalder, age 77, of Stamford, Neb. died July 13, 2010 at Beaver City Manor at Beaver City, Neb. He was born Sept. 10, 1932 at Beaver City, Neb. to John Ernest and Edith Jane (McCormack) Stalder.

He was raised on a farm in the Beaver City area and graduated from Beaver City High School with the Class of 1950. Following graduation he started farming and continued to farm all of his life. He served with the US Army from Jan. 14, 1954 until Dec. 7, 1955.

He married Jerry Lou Spratling on March 28, 1954 at Norton. They farmed in the Almena area for 5 years before moving to the present farm south east of Beaver City in 1961. He operated Stalder Well Drilling with licenses in Nebraska and Kansas until 2005, but continued his love for farming. He attended the Congregational Church in Almena. He was a member of American Legion Post #28 of Beaver City, Neb.

He was preceded in death by his parents, son Gary in 1969, daughters Donna in 1969 and Diane Gewecke in 2006, one brother Donald Stalder in 1987

Home food preservation safely

Increasing interest in gardening and shopping for locally grown foods at farmers markets and produce stands is prompting increased interest in home food preservation.

While preserving summer crops can add flavor, color and health-promoting nutrients to winter meals, and, often a cost savings, the failure to follow food safety guidelines in preserving food can be deadly.

Extension Offices have been fielding a lot of questions about canning green beans lately.

Heed this warning that using a boiling water canner rather than a

recommended -- and tested -- pressure canner is risky because spores of Clostridium botulinum bacteria, which are naturally occurring in soils, are heat resistant.

The heat in a boiling water canner is not enough to kill the spores that can germinate and grow into

active bacterial cells that will produce a toxin that is deadly to humans.

While improperly canned low acid foods, including all vegetables and meats, may lose their color, develop a cloudy appearance or have lids that pop, contamination is not always visible.

Do not taste suspect food, but do use tested recipes and follow directions exactly for successful home food preservation.

A pressure canning gauge and seal should be checked annually prior to use.

If you would like to have your dial gauge from your pressure can-

ner checked, call you local K-State Research and Extension Office. Most of them have equipment to test the accuracy of dial gauges.

The small round rocker gauges do not need to be tested because they remain accurate.

And, if timid about canning, freezing is always an option.
