The conference agenda included leadership and team building exercises, meeting Capitol Hill staff members who are "alumni" of National Rural Electric Cooperative Youth Tour, and a competition to select the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's National Youth Spokesperson.

While in Washington, the Youth Leadership Council members gain a broader understanding of cooperatives through the discussions with Glenn English, CEO, of National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, Sheldon Peterson, governor of the National Rural Cooperative Finance Corporation and Bob Phillips, CEO of the National Rural Telecommunications Cooperative.
