
#### Hunter safety class pushed back a little

### Bridges, budget on table

the Norton County commissioners' time last Monday as county leaders struggled with the annual problems of roads and revenues.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan told the commissioners that Brian Engelke with the Kansas Department of Transportation's Local Projects division helped him come up with a plan for bridges in the county that might need to be repaired or replaced. However, he said, the document shows several bridges on roads that Mr. Engelke said should be closed.

The commissioners said that they would review the documents before taking any action.

Mr. Brannan also told the commissioners that he has been working with the Federal Emergency Management Agency for help to repair several damaged roads.

On the subject of road repairs, Mr. Brannan said, work on West Washington will begin this week and the road will be closed for about one month. The milling was to begin Monday and the project will include a cut down and relaying of the surface.

The only other item on Mr. Brannan's list was a blade for the county's Bobcat. He had a bid for \$4,365 with a government discount. The commissioners asked him to visit with Otter Dozer for a quote to build a blade for the machine to see if that would be cheaper.

This is budget time for the county and the commissioners met with John Mapes of Mapes and Miller Accounting as they started work on this project. The commissioners reviewed proposed budgets in order to get the one with the lowest mill levy in order to keep taxes as low as possible. The final budget will depend on the quote that the county expects to get this week from Blue Cross and Blue Shield for employee insurance benefits, a large expense. In other business, the commissioners: Met with John Trembly and Ray Dreher with the Norhwest Kansas Community Corrections to review a grant, which is used to help pay for offender (**COUNTY** - Continued on Page 5)
