School board to change voting districts

Restructuring voting districts to comply with Kansas Law was a decision made by the Board of Education, Unified School District on Thursday.

Superintendent Greg Mann reported that all vehicles had been inspected and passed; the new route bus that Lenora had ordered was here and ready to use; the new computers are in and have been switched over; the scoreboards from Lenora were to be installed in the East Campus soon.

Scott Ellis volunteered to give the welcome to the staff on Tuesday. Ellis said he had received several comments on how nice the tennis courts were.

Mann said he had received a letter from Kansas State Department of Education congratulating the district for having all of the district's teachers meeting the highly qualified status.

The 2010-'11 budget was approved as published.

Superintendent Mann reported that the Appreciation Plaque committee had met and recommended John and Lisa

Millan to be added to the plaque. The and delivery of the students. Board voted and approved to accept the committee's recommendation.

The board considered the options available to equalize the number of voters in each of the representative districts. By Kansas law, school districts who have representative districts may have no more than a 5 percent difference in the number of registered voters between the Districts. Two possible solutions were considered and the Board approved possibility No.

1. District 1 will be Ward 1, Ward 2, and Lenora City with registered voters totaling 1523. District 2 will be Ward 3, Rural Norton, Highland, Edmond, Rural 213, and Graham County with registered voters totaling 1513 a difference of 0.65 percent.

The Board directed Superintendent Mann to re-advertise the Board of Education vacancy in District 1 with the updated eligibility information to include the affected additional territory.

Jim Jackson discussed transportation for Lenora area students. He said 1 bus and 1 suburban will be used for pickup

Grant to help pay for truck

c.haynes@nwkansas.com Norton County will be getting a \$106,845 grant from the Kansas Department of Commerce for the purchase of a new fire truck.

The truck will be for the Solomon Valley Fire department and the county will need to provide an 18 percent match or \$18,855.

The grant will help pay \$97,145 for the fire truck and \$9,700 in administrative costs.

The grant contract between the state and the county began on Sunday and runs for two years. The county must purchase and prepare the truck for use in that time to keep the state money.
