Oregonian donates flag pole to Valley Hope

Louie Tholen of Baker City, Oregon, drove back to Norton just as he has for the past several years in order to attend the Valley Hope Alkathon but this time he brought a little something with him. A 400 pound, 32 foot flagpole.

The 80 year-old gentleman identified himself as a former patient of Valley Hope. He went through the program almost 42 years ago and before he left he was asked to build a flagpole for the treatment facility. A year later he returned and brought with him the flagpole that still stands at the facility today.

Now, nearing his 42nd sobriety birthday Louie has returned with another work of art and this new flagpole was put up at the corporate office Wednesday. He worked on and off all winter long to build this gift of gratitude, a donation to the facility.

Mr. Tholen said, "Mr. Leipold is one of the reasons I did this, I have all the appreciation in the world for the man. If it weren't for him I may have been dead 40 years ago."

After treatment, Louis enjoyed the life of sobriety, a happy marriage, children and a successful business in welding. He started welding 70 years ago and after selling the business to his son he fills his spare time rebuilding and restoring engines, making flagpoles and time with

Louie got to Norton on Monday and plans to stay for his fourth Alkathon in a row, missing his 53rd wedding anniversary to be here then heading back home on Saturday night.

The flagpole and its base, consisting of 20 feet of one inch tubing were driven down here in pieces. After arriving Mr. Tholen welded the three main pieces of the pole together, adding the ball at the top and the other parts to hang the flag. The base was planted four feet deep in a hole with a top cap of concrete and large bolts has flown over the Kansas State Capitol to secure the pole to the base.

After the pole was painted, Prairie **Tonight** - Mostly clear with a low around Land Electric provided a boom truck to come and lift the pole into position. Megan O'Connor, Valley Hope Director of Development, said, "Two flags have been donated to fly on this pole, Jerry Moran's office donated a US flag that has flown over the capitol in Washington City, donated the Kansas State Flag that celebration.
