resident, ran the Leadville 100 Aug. 25, in Leadville, Colo. He finished sixth with a time of 19 hours and 19 minutes.

The Leadville Trail 100 Ultra marathon (aka The Race Across the Sky or the LT100) was first run in 1983. It is held annually on trails and dirt roads at high altitude west and south of Leadville, through the heart of the Rocky mountains. The course is very difficult, climbing and descending 15,600 feet with elevations ranging between 9,200 to 12,620 feet. Because of its difficulty, it is common for less than half the starters to complete the race ahead of its 30 hour time

Starting at 4 a.m., the LT100 is strictly first-come, first-served. This year, 845 runners started with 363 finishing. The course record for men is 15 hours and 42 minutes. For the first time in the race's history, it was finished in daylight.

"I felt amazing up to 94 miles, and the the wheels came off big time. Zero left in my quads and hypothermic." said Waggoner.
