# Hay bales catch fire at rural county home

On Thursday afternoon the Norton Rural Fire Department responded to a fire call at the residence of Chad and Darcie Brooks in rural Norton County.

Earlier in the day a tub grinder had been used to process hay and straw. The tub grinder 's belts got hot, burst into flame and

was believed to have been extinguished and the grinder was taken back to the farm of Chris and Mindy Harting.

The belts that blew off the grinder smoldered in a dry hay pile and were fanned by the wind. The result was a fire that claimed 50 bales of CPR grass and straw and had a plume of black smoke on the horizon.

"The belts smoldered, the wind blew and that was all she were tossed off. The fire that happened with the tub grinder wrote." said Mindy Harting when asked about the fire.
