State Senator Ralph Ostmeyer
 "I've visited with a lot of people and they say we need help in western Kansas," said Ostmeyer. "We've got a great state but we're struggling. Our businesses are the key to our economy and we've got a lot of good businesses so that is a good thing."
 "We've got problems but things will turn around because we have a great state."
 "The EPA is going after everything. They want electricity instead of diesel power and many more changes. The EPA scares me and re-apportionment scares me. I have 18 counties in my senatorial district now and I'll pick up some more."
 "Thanks to everyone for your support."
 Ostmeyer was accompanied by wife, Kay.
State Senator Tim Huelskamp
 Huelskamp is a family farmer and rancher. He works with his father and brother on the farm his grandparents pioneered in 1923. Tim and wife, Angela, are parents of four adopted children.
 He received his social science teaching degree from College of Santa Fe and received his Ph.D. in political science

with specialization in agricultural policy making from The American University in Washington, D.C.
 "The western Kansas voters made the difference in the congressional election," said Huelskamp. "I'm very appreciative of the support and thank you all for caring."
 "I do not agree with the new health care program. I believe in limited government and protecting the freedoms of our citizens."

Ward Cassidy
 Cassidy has 40 years of experience in education as a teacher, counselor and principal.
 "This is my first time in politics," Cassidy told the crowd. "My pledge is that northwest Kansas will be my first interest."

Kris Kobach
 Kris Kobach was the only speaker with a prop. He brought with him an antique ballot box from the 1800s to make his point about voter fraud.
 He said there has always been voter

fraud and still is today. Kobach said pro-slave stater came from Missouri to stuff ballot boxes in Kansas.
 He demonstrated how the antique ballot box was locked but pointed out that when it was used in a March, 1855 election it was stuffed with fraudulent ballots. He said that the district had 2,905 voters registered and there were 6,307 votes cast!
 "There is still some voter fraud in Kansas but none has been prosecuted," he said.
 Kobach said it is his opinion that the deciding vote in Congress for the new healthcare bill, which he called Obamacare, was probably illegal since the legality of the person who cast the vote is under investigation.
 "In my campaign, I'm pushing to get the following requirements for voters: a photo identification and proof of citizenship. As secretary of state, I will prosecute voter fraud," he said.
Derek Schmidt
 "We want to take this nation and state back," said Schmidt. "Five of our state officers were appointed by a governor that is not even here."
 "These appointed people are in charge of the state we all love."
 "We have a lot of work to do to get to

the finish line. There are many legal issues to be decided.
 "We need our western Kansas voters to show up in the next election. The Democrats are working hard in the cities and we need to make a difference by getting the vote out in the west."
