The Norton Blue Jays shut out Ellis

com Coach Lucas Melvin's Norton Community High School football team started the 2010 season on Friday by shutting out Ellis 13-0 on their home field.

The Norton offense was the superior one of the two and threatened many times, including two field goal misses, but scored just once in each half. On the other hand, the Railroaders had just two opportunities to score and the vicious Blue Jay defenders would have none of it.

The Railroaders' first chance to score came on the opening kickoff when they ran the ball to the Norton9vard-line. Ablocking-in-theback penalty moved them back to the 25 and they were unable to get in the end zone.

Late in the first half, Ellis threatened to score but Norton defensive back Billy Broeckelman hit 6'4", 215 pound tight end Jared Herl so hard in the end zone that he dropped the ball! Norton fans will remember that last year's game between Norton and Ellis ended on a similar play when Herl caught a touchdown pass to defeat the Blue Jays.

Ellis did not threaten in the second half against the "Blue for 18 yards. Swarm" defense and Norton drove the length of the field to score late in the game for the clincher that brought the satisfying victory!

The game was well played fundamentally by both squads with 9 passes for 28 yards. Lane had 2 neither having a lost fumble or pass interception.

Norton rolled up 310 yards of offense compared to only 130 total yards for Ellis. Norton averaged 5.4 yards per carry and Ellis had an average of 4.3 yards per rush.

Neither team passed much. Norton had 28 yards passing and Ellis had 7 yards through the air.

Penalties were about even with Norton losing 64 yards on infractions and Ellis 55 yards.

"Our defense really did a good job the entire game," said coach Melvin. "Our offense was good as well but we left a lot of points off the scoreboard. Norton's Terrell Lane had a great season opening game from his tailback spot. He carried the ball 22 times for 193 yards and an average of 8.8 yards per carry.

Other ball carriers for Norton and their yardage were: Spencer Shirk, 15 carries for 38 yards; Jeremy Sproul, 10 carries for 33 yards and Brett Terrell, 5 carries

Lane punted three times for a 31 yard average. He also had 2 punt returns for 55 yards and Broeckelman had 1 return for 15 yards.

Spencer Shirk completed 5 of receptions for 16 yards, Broeckelman had 2 for 8 yards and Griffith had 1 for 4 yards.

Senior kicker Caleb Laughlin had 3 kickoffs for a 40.3 yard average.

Leading rusher for Ellis was senior back Jacob Kinderknecht who gained 107 yards on 14 attempts for a 7.6 yard average.

Leading tackler for Norton was Landon Keiswetter with 4 solos, 4 assists, 8 total; followed by Kaid McKenna, 4 solos, 3 assists, 7 total; Billy Broeckelman, 3 solos, 2 assists, 5 total; Jeremy Sproul, 4 solos, 1 assist, 5 total; Tye Nickell, 4 solos; Luke Ninemire, 4 solos; sists, 3 total; Terrell Lane, 1 solo, 1 "They had several big runs assist, 2 total; Trey Millan, 1 solo, McKenna, I solo; Casey Temmel, 1 assist.

Lane got a good start on his night as he ran 12 yards on first down to the 34, added 10 more on the next down and got another nice hole on his third carry for 14 more yards to the Ellis 42.

Brett Terrell got his first carry of the pigskin and got loose over left tacke for a first down on the Ellis 28. Sproul got 1 yard, Lane 1 and Shirk 2 around left end as the Railroader defense stiffened. Laughlin tried a field goal. It was lined up right but fell just short and Ellis took over the ball on their 20.

After a 7 yard gain, Keiswetter tackled Riley Hunsicker for a 2 yard loss and Casey Temmel ran Hunsicker out of bounds for no gain. Ellis punted and Lane eluded potential tacklers all the way to the Ellis 17-yard line!

Sproul lost 2 yards, a flat pass to Griffith netted 5 yards and a flat pass to Broeckelman made 3 more yards. On fourth down, Ellis jumped off sides and Norton first down, then got loose for a 63 got a first down by inches on the yard run to the Norton 12-yard-

Sproul and Ninemire made good tackles on successive plays for no Ellis gains before Kinderknecht made 7 yards. Ellis punted out of bounds on the Norton 23. Lane gained 11 yards on first down but the Blue Jays had to punt after three more plays. Lane's boot carried to the Ellis 19 yard line.

Ninemire dropped the Ellis ball carrier after a 1 yard gain, a pass was incomplete and Sproul tackled quarterback Hunsicker for a big loss back on the 6-yard-line!

Ellis punted and Broeckelman got a 15 yard return. Shirk ran the keeper for 2 yards before Lane got loose on a big run over the right side of the line to the Ellis 9-yard-line.

The Railroader defense stiffened, however, and Laughlin tried another field goal but it was wide of the mark.

Ellis took over on their 20. Kinderknecht gained 5 yards on the first half with the Blue Jays still on top 7-0.

Third quarter Ellis kicked off to Norton to start

the second half. A series of penalties hurt the Jays and Lane punted to the Railroader 39. Kinderknecht ran around right end and Broeckelman ran him out of bounds after a 4-yard-gain. Ninemire tackled Kinderknecht after 1 yard and a long pass was incomplete. Ellis punted and Lane returned the ball to the Norton 38.

Shirk sneaked for 5 yards, then Lane got a big block from Riggins and rambled to the Ellis 33. Shirk gained 3 yards and the game was delayed for a lengthy period while an ambulance went to Hays and back.

After the delay, Norton was stopped on the Ellis 27. Terrell tackled Kinderknecht after 2 yards but Joey Augustine found a hole in the Norton line and ran to the Blue Jay 46. Kinderknecht gained 7 yards before Keiswetter dropped him to the turf. He got the ball again but Sproul and Company made him lose 2 yards. Ninemire and Keiswetter sacked the quarterback for a 13 yard loss and Ellis punted out of bounds on the Norton 22.

Lane broke two tackles and earned a first down on the Ellis 45! Lane and Terrell gained more yardage, then Shirk ran around left end for a first down on the Ellis 28. After an incomplete pass, the quarter ended with the Jays still on top 7-0.

Fourth quarter

The Norton drive bogged down as the final quarter began and Ellis took over.

With Sproul, Keiswetter and Ninemire wreaking havoc in the Railroader backfield, they punted the ball to the Norton 23.

The play by the fired up Norton defense carried over to the offense and they put together a determined



drive for the Blue Jays' second touchdown. With the guys up front moving out the Ellis defenders and Lane and Sproul running their hardest of the game, the Blue Jays drove 77 yards for their final score. Shirk got the touchdown on a sneak with 1:36 left in the game.

Laughlin's extra point attempt was blocked but the 13-0 Norton lead was safe. Trey Millan upset the Ellis kickoff receiver with a tremendous tackle on the Railroader 22-yard-line!

The Railroaders went exclusively to the passing game but it was very ineffective and the game ended with Sproul and Company sacking the quarterback!

Next action

Norton willl host the St. Francis Indians at 7 p.m. this Friday in the Blue Jays' season home opener.

St. Francis lost a high scoring 47-22 game to an outstanding Colby eleven last Friday night.

The Indians are a solid team under second year head coach Nathan Smith, who guided them to a solid 7-4 mark last season.

They run a wishbone offense of the Smith Center variety and employ a 4-3 defense.

St. Francis has 14 returning lettermen.

'St. Francis should have a good team," said coach Melvin. "We've beaten them the last couple of years so they will want revenge.

"They have some good sized linemen. Their backs aren't too big but they are quick.

"Our goal is to work to get better this week and play as hard as we can against St. Francis."


