The Lady Jays placed second to a top quality McCook squad.

McCook scored 29 points, followed by Norton, 62; Colby, 63; Quinter, 134; Oakley, 137; Oberlin, 151; Southwest, 154.

The Norton boys defeated Mc-Cook and all other teams to win the championship. The Blue Jays scored 43 points, followed by Mc-Cook, 59; Oberlin, 73; Colby, 79; Phillipsburg, 96.

"Our girls came to Oberlin tonight focused and ready to run," said coach Rossi. "Conditions were nearly perfect and our times reflect the conditons.

against Claflin.


"In their final match, they met Schneider and Crittenden of Tribune who were seeded above them in the bracket and were able to win easily. They showed that they deserved a higher seed."
