is behind the project.

Demolition work is expected to begin soon. Nelson said bulldozers could begin within two weeks. Work on the motel may begin by the first of November.

The project has moved quickly after the Norton Development Corporation completed a study and found a need for a new hotel, Nelson said.

The new hotel isn't meant to compete with or replace any of the current facilities, said Scott Sproul, Norton City/County Economic Development Director.

Instead it will add additional accommodations, which are needed

throughout the year as identified by the Development Corporation study, and help attract regional

Sproul said the additional rooms also will be on demand during National Guard duty weekends.

The investment group plans to hire a general contractor in the next couple of weeks. Mark Griffin will oversee the project for the investment group, Nelson said.

More information about the size of the new hotel and amenities will be available following meetings with hotel representatives.

"It's an exciting project for the community," Sproul said.

and cell phones. Beckman emphasized manners and safety using 911. The format for the lesson was putting together pieces of a jigsaw puzzle. Students also sounded out the words on the puzzle pieces, and they were quick to recognize them and shout them out.

The youngsters already knew to press the "green" send button after entering 911 when making an emergency call. They also learned what to say if they need to call in an emergency and what constitutes an emergency such as a fire, if someone is hurt or if they are lost.

Beckman also stressed the need

to know important telephone numbers including their home

number and family members'

numbers. Third and fifth grade students learn about internet safety in a "tic tac know" game, learning about on-line predators, dangers on social sites and were warned not to meet anyone they meet on-line, Beckman said.

Presentations are scheduled in 27 Northwest Kansas schools where Rural Telephone or Nex-Tech provide service, beginning in October, which is cooperative month.
