# Program Saturday gives dogs a second chance

The Second Chance Homeless Pet Society will hold their annual Trivia Night, a major fundraising event Oct. 23 at 7 p.m. at the Norton Eagles Lodge. There is a 6 p.m. registration. Tables are \$50, and each team should have six to eight members.

Trivia Night has become a fun and popular way to raise money for the society. Proceeds are used to buy supplies, spay and neuter the dogs, buy collars and leashes and other items that may be needed.

Second Chance Homeless Pet

Society was started in 1997 with the placement of two puppies at the Norton Correctional Facility. The society worked with the Norton Correctional Facility to develop a program that would benefit both inmates and the homeless animals.

Kathy Thibedeau, unit team manager and counselor at the Correctional Facility and Linda Terrell, also a counselor and president of Second Chance oversee the program.

Terry Romey, a member of Second Chance and a mechanical supervisor at the Norton Correctional Facility, is the one who

transports most of the animals to the veterinarian, sets up times for adoption, and picks up the rescued animals that will enter the program. Some of the rescued dogs have been picked up by Norton's Animal Control Officer, Sherry Hickman, and were rescued after entering the local pound.

"We have a veterinarian in Hays that gives us a good deal with the spay and neuters, shots and other medical needs," said Romey"

Romey said that there are usually six to seven dogs in the program at a time. The dogs live with their handlers in their dorm rooms and accompany the handler in all

their activities with the exception of meal time.

"Each dog will be housebroken, have some basic training, and social skills when it becomes eligible for adoption. The dogs will be spayed or neutered and have all of the shots," said Romey.

Second Chance charges \$80 for the adoption of a rescued dog.
