Groundbreaking held for new hotel

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The first shovelful of dirt was turned in preparation for construction of the new Sleep Inn to be built at 201 East Holmes Street, or East Highway 36 Thursday afternoon.

The new hotel will be owned and operated by Norton Motel, LLC. Norman Nelson and his wife Gloria have a majority interest in the company.

Mark Griffin will be the hotel orga-

"I'm very proud to be involved in this and think it's one of the best projects for Norton so far," said Norman Nelson, who, along with his wife Gloria, is a majority stock owner.

The planned hotel will have 50 guest

Guests can have a complimentary morning medley breakfast, free highspeed internet access, complimentary newspaper and an exercise room.

Rooms will feature an oversized work area, large showers, in-room coffee, microwave, refrigerator, iPod compatible radio, iPhone/USB charging station, flat screen television and a personal safe.

"The services and amenities of the hotel are designed to exceed the expectations of both business and leisure travelers," Mark Griffin said in a news release.

Construction of the new building is

slated to begin early next month with a completion date in May.

The hotel will have rooms with king and queen sized beds and a two bedroom suite, said Dave Peterson, who will be the project manager.

Peterson just served in the same capacity for the construction of the recently completed Sleep Inn in Colby.

"I'm excited to be a part of it and part of the community," Peterson said.

Sleep Inn is a chain of mid-priced, limited service properties, and a franchised by Choice Hotels International, Inc.

A study completed by the Norton Development Corporation found a need for the new hotel, according to Nelson.

It was that study that prompted the group to initiate the new hotel project.

"It's a very exciting day. This is the first of many projects," said Norton City/ County Economic Development Director Scott Sproul.

The new hotel is expected to open in

Three buildings will be demolished in the next couple of weeks to make room for the new hotel. Two of them Kansasland Tire building and J & R Repair were vacant. The third housed the Beacon Cafe, which closed a few weeks ago.

Cafe owner Jerry Clason is tearing down that building, and the other two will be demolished in the next few weeks.

cessed Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Instructional permits and driver education restricted licenses can be done in the office by appointment only. You will need to bring an original state issued certified birth certificate, social security card for the applicant and a utility bill with current address plus the driver license of the parent that brings

Congressional hopeful makes local campaign stop

jsherard@nwkansas With the Nov. 2 election just weeks away, campaigning is in full swing.

Alan Jilka, Salina Democrat running to represent the first district in Congress, was in Norton Tuesday.

Jilka, a Notre Dame graduate, has worked as a staff member for former Senator Nancy Kassebaum and former Representative Dan Glickman. He also served as a Salina city commissioner and three term mayor.

Doug Sebelius accom-Alan Jilka panied Jilka. Sebelius said he's reaching across party lines to support the Democrat because he's

interested in politics not partisanship. "Too many are interested in personalities not public interest," Sebelius

said. Jilka said he appreciates Sebelius lending his support and his name. Jilka didn't know Sebelius' father, the former Congressman from this district, but knows he was a good man whose

name implies integrity, a willingness

to build relationships and good public service, Jilka said.

"I aspire to earn the kind of reputation Doug's dad had by virtue of his service to the district,"

he said.

Jilka mentioned four issues at the top of his todo list if elected. First he would address agriculture economy looking at some of the new Environmental Protection Agency regulations and anti-agriculture special interest groups. A second issue of importance to Jilka is finding a realistic solution for the federal budget.

Working toward energy independence is another concern because the United States is now dependent on

others for 65 percent of our energy. Immigration is the final point Jilka mentioned. To see the problems firsthand, he spent a week at the Mexican border. Enhanced security is one answer. However, he also sees a need to deal with the 12 million undocumented immigrants already in the country while looking out for the country's own economic best interest.

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
