

Lady Jays play in Mid-Continent League Tournament but their four game winning streak comes to an end

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Peggy Cox's Norton Community High School girls varsity volleyball team took a four-match winning streak into the annual Mid-Continent League Tournament last Saturday in Norton but was unable to sustain the streak.

After previously defeating Leoti/Wichita County, Golden Plains and Logan, the Lady Blue Jays hosted Stockton on Thursday in a feather bracket match to get into the tournament and defeated the Lady Tigers 25-7, 26-24.

In the tournament on Saturday morning, they met the No.1 seed and No.1 state ranked Phillipsburg Lady Panthers and lost 3-25, 15-25.

Their next opponent in pool play was the outstanding Smith Center Lady Red squad and, although Norton played better, they lost 17-25, 16-25.

Their third opponent was the Ellis Lady Railroaders and the Lady Jays played them very close. Norton won the first set 25-19 before losing 18-25, 18-25.

The top two teams from each of two pools moved on to the semifinals and finals. Phillipsburg was the top team in Norton's pool and played Trego Community, the second place team in the other pool. The Lady Panthers won 23-25, 25-19, 25-8 to advance to the finals.

In the other semi-finals match, Hill City was the top team in the pool and played the No.2 team Smith Center. The Lady Red won 25-17, 24-26, 25-22.

In the championship finals versus Smith Center, Phillipsburg ranked team in the state of Kansas won 25-7, 21-25, 25-13.

The Lady Jays came out powerful and aggressive against the Lady Tigers from Stockton on Thursday evening.

"We took control of the first set and never looked back," said coach Cox.

"Our Lady Jays traded points back and forth with the Ellis Lady Railroaders for the first twelve rotations and then we gradually pulled away for the win in the first set," said coach Cox.

Norton will compete in the Class 3A Sub-State Volleyball Tournament on Saturday in Smith Center.

Norton is seeded No. 8 and will play No. 1 seeded Phillipsburg at 1 p.m.

Other matches will feature No. 4 seed Riley County versus No. 5 seed Marysville in the upper bracket and No. 2 seed Minneapolis versus No. 7 Beloit and No. 3 Smith Center versus No. 6 Ellsworth in the lower bracket.

Winners of the Norton-Phillipsburg and Riley County-Marysville matches and winners of the Minneapolis-Beloit and Smith Center-Ellsworth matches will meet in the semi-finals with the winners of those matches playing in the championship finals to qualify for the State Tournament.


