# Tame the holiday sweet tooth

For many, the Halloween holiday marks the beginning of the "eating season". Holiday events, meals and snacks can challenge the resolve to choose and serve health-promoting foods.

Children's nutrition specialists provide the following tips to help parents during the holiday season:

Plan a sandwich or light meal before trick or treating, a delayed meal or later family gathering. If children are satisfied, they will be less likely to choose unhealthy foods.

Help children sort their treats, and encourage a selection of one or two items. Invite them to help you decide how the remainder of the candy or other special foods

can be incorporated into meals and snacks.

Be matter-of-fact. Try not to make food an issue. Once the candy is out of sight, children may forget it. The same is true at a family dinner or other community meal, when a child may skip unfamiliar foods. If parents can avoid making too much of a child's one-time food choices and instead focus on the overall adequacy, food issues

can be avoided.

He or she may be more willing to try new foods when older or when the food is offered at another time or place.

Store the remaining candy out of sight. Freeze candy bars for future use. Store hard candy in an airtight container.

Focus on fun with friends and family and holiday traditions, rather than sweets.

Have healthy snacks available, such as fresh fruit, veggies and a low fat dip, low fat dairy products, and whole grain crackers.

Parents are encouraged to accompany young children and to limit trick-or-treating to the immediate neighborhood.

Many schools and community organizations also plan holiday celebrations in a safe environment.
