Vehicle accident claims life

A former Norton resident was fatally injured in a two vehicle accident at 8:38 a.m., Wednesday, Nov. 10, in Decatur County, about one mile south of Oberlin.

Mickeal Quakenbush, 26, Oberlin, driving a 1989 Jeep, was northbound on US83 when his vehicle crossed the center line and struck the trailer of a southbound 2005 semi driven by Kenneth E. Jones, 64, Altus, Okla. Quakenbush was pronounced dead at the scene.

According to the Kansas State Highway Patrol accident report Ouakenbush was not wearing a safety restraint.

The driver of the semi, Jones was wearing a safety restraint and was not injured in the accident.

Decatur County emergency personnel responded to the accident.

The Kansas State Highway Patrol was in charge of the investigation.
