Norton Junior High football team wins two this fall

Norton Junior High Jays season was on September 20 against Goodland at home and was their second win by a 32-0 score.

Norton was the only team to score in the first quarter 8-0. Neither team scored in the second quarter leaving the half time score at 8-0.

The Junior Jays scored again in the third quarter, ending it at 14-0. In the final quarter of play, Norton scored 18 points to Goodland's zero ending the game 32-0.

Head Coach Shane Miller said, "This was a great defensive effort by our football team. Goodland lines up in a spread type offense and passes the ball more than

The third football game of the most junior high football teams. Goodland threw the ball 25 times for only 8 completions and 8 yards. This was largely due to our defensive line getting good pressure on the quarterback and just being more physical up front. We also held them to 8 rushing yards.

"Our physical play wore them down and allowed us to put the game out of reach in the fourth quarter. This was a game where we had 5 different players score. It was nice to spread the ball around to different running backs and all of them contributed at key times."

The leading Blue Jay rusher was Derick Campbell with 12 carries, 78 yards followed by Christian Boser, 8 carries, 57 yards; Jared Tallent, 6 carries, 59 yards; Caysean Campbell, 4 carries, 49 yards and Kendall Miller, 3 carries for 10 yards.

Quarterback Kendall Miller attempted 5 passes and completed one to Campbell for 4 yards.

The leading tacklers were Miller and Wyatt Harting with 7each, followed by Tallent, 6; Campbell and Breven Sondergaard, 5 each; Jordan Karnopp, 4; and Conor Cox and Derek Rowh, 3 each. NJHS vs. Oakley

Norton scored 20 points in the first quarter and none in the second quarter ending the first half 20-0.

During the third quarter, the Jays scored 24 more points, leaving the score at 48-0. In the last quarter of play, Norton finished out by scoring 8 more points to win the game 52-0.

Head Coach Shane Miller said, "I was very proud of our football team in their dominating win at Oakley. This was a game that was fun to play in because we were able to make 'big' plays. We had 6 scores of greater than 45 yards. Our offensive line of Wyatt Harting, Jordan Karnopp, Tyler Kuhn, Breven Sondergaard, Derek Rowh, Chris Reynolds and Conor Cox did a great job of making holes and giving our quarterback time to throw. We were able to rush the ball 400 total yards and throw the ball for 78 yards.

Defensively we held Oakley to 28 total yards and Oakley never really threatened to score. Oakley was obviously getting frustrated in their lack of production and our players did a nice job of playing hard and doing so with class."

The leading Blue Jay rusher was Christian Boser with 4 carries for 182 yards followed by Derek Campbell, 6 carries, 85 yards;

Jared Tallent, 5 carries, 83 yards and Kendall Miller, 3 carries for 49 yards.

Quarterback Kendall Miller had 10 passing attempts completing 6. Conor Cox caught one for 58 yards and Tallent had 5 for 20 yards.

The leading tackler was Miller with 11 followed by Wyatt Harting, 10; Tallent and Boser, 6 each; Caysan Campbell, 4 and Derek Rowh, Conor Cox and Kobie Unterseher, 3 each.

Congressman Moran joins others in approving earmark moratorium

Congressman Jerry Moran joined members of the U.S. Senate Republican Conference as Senator-Elect to enact a twoyear earmark moratorium for the 112th Congress. The Republican Conference approved the earmark moratorium, and a resolution challenging Senate Democrats to enact a two-year earmark moratorium. The Conference-approved moratorium is the same as one approved by House Republicans.

Members of the Senate Republican Conference also adopted resolutions to reduce federal debt and government spending, including the following:

Resolution placing a moratorium on creating new unfunded mandates and new entitlement programs.

The first resolution states the Conference's opposition to imposing new unfunded federal mandates, like the health care law. on state and local governments, and the second states the Conference's opposition to creating new entitlement programs - which currently make up 56 percent of the total budget.

Resolution stating that a Balanced Budget Amendment to the United States Constitution is necessary to restore fiscal discipline.

The resolution states that a balanced budget amendment should require the President to submit to Congress prior to each fiscal year a proposed budget in which total federal spending does not exceed total federal revenue; that a balanced budget amendment should include a requirement that a supermajority of both houses of Congress be necessary to increase taxes; that a balanced budget amendment should include a limitation on total federal spending.

Resolution stating unspent stimulus funds should be canceled.

The resolution would cancel the more than \$12 billion of unspent stimulus funds and avoid saddling taxpayers with more debt.

Resolution stating that there should be a net federal hiring freeze on non-security employ-

Between 2008 and 2010, federal government civilian employment grew 20 percent, from 1.2 million civilian workers to 1.43 million. Shrinking the size of government through attrition is both fair and smart.

Resolution stating that nonsecurity discretionary spending should be reduced to inflationadjusted FY 2008 levels.

The resolution would save ap-

proximately \$450 billion over ten years, and such a reduction should be enforced through discretionary spending caps.

The Republican Conference also agreed to develop proposals to use funds unspent by Members of Congress to reduce the federal debt and to reduce legislative branch appropriations.
