notes in the Reentry Plans and paints a detailed picture of the process explaining what has or has not happened with an inmate (it is rumored she once limited out a narrative section that wasn't supposed to have a limit). In sessions with inmates she very naturally utilizes a variety of communication skills for which she has been trained. She does an excellent job of suspending judgment in her interactions with inmates despite her personal feeling and as a result, easily establishes a rapport conductive to open sharing for the inmates. This gives us a better picture of their risks and needs for release.
