Morelock was taken to Hays Medical Center. Normandin was pronounced dead at the scene.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reported Morelock was wearing safety restraints while Normandin was not.

Succeeding in a Challenging Beef Industry is the focus for the 2011 Tri-State Cow/Calf Symposium and Trade Show to be held on Jan. 12, 2011.

Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the program starting at 10 a.m. thru 3p.m. Central Standard Time at the Riverside Country Club in St. Francis. The symposium is held in conjunction with a trade show. Attendees will have time to visit displays throughout the day.

The program will begin with a "Systems Approach to Lowering Winter Feed Costs" presenter, Aaron Stalker, University of Nebraska. K-State Research and

Extension specialist Sandy Johnson, will discuss the "Importance of and Factors Affecting Body Condition Scoring." The morning will end with a program discussing "Current Issues in Beef Cattle Genetics."
