Tuesday Norton senior to play in Shrine Bowl

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Terrell Lane, Norton Community High School's 5'11", 220-pound senior tailback, defensive back, has been chosen by the Kansas news media as a member of the West squad in the 38th annual 2011 Kansas Shrine Bowl All-Star Football Game.

Terrell will be one of 34 players on the West team which will compete against the East squad of Kansas senior players in the annual game on Saturday, July 30 at Lewis Field Stadium in Hays.

A shifty and hard-running back for the Norton Blue Jays, Terrell has received All-Mid-Continent League recognition the past four years. He was a unanimous choice of league coaches this season as first team running back and was also named first team kick returner.

He was an honorable mention all-league tailback last

and second team kick returner his sophomore year. Terrell also received honorable mention as a running back in the league his freshman season.

Terrell had a super senior season for the 9-1 Blue Jays. He rushed for 1,768 yards on 148 carries for an average of 11.95 yards per carry and rushed for 26

In addition to being honored by the league coaches this season, Terrell was also chosen to a number of postseason honorary teams.

He was selected to the All Area Super 11 by the Hays Daily News, named first team in Class 3A on offense by the Topeka Capital-Journal and received honorable mention in the Wichita Eagle-Beacon.

The Salina Journal no longer selects players for postseason honors.

Terrell was also a first team running back on the Class season, a first team choice on offense, first team punter 3A All-State Team chosen by the Kansas High School

Football Coaches Association.

He has also been chosen as a Class 3A first team running back by the Kansas PreGame Magazine(Kpreps. com) and was also named to their Second 11 Team.

Terrell is the son of Heidi Lane Davis of Norton.

Head coach of the West team will be Rick Wheeler, Wichita Heights. His assistant coaches will be Brian Hill, Garden City; Dan Adelhardt, Kapaun-Mt. Carmel; Jeff Geist, Abilene; Sean Racette, Trinity; Brett Kendrick, Stanton County.

More charges in Oberlin poaching case

Additional charges were filed last week in an alleged poaching case in which 12 bucks were killed in Decatur County.

Margaret Mahoney, with the Hirsch and Pratt law office, said a felony charge of commercialization of wildlife had been filed against six of seven people involved in the case, but warrants in the case had not been served.

Ms. Mahoney said she couldn't release the names or the charges other than the felony one.

In addition to five men from Wisconsin being arrested on Wednesday, Dec. 8, on charges of illegally killing a trophy-size mule deer, Ms. Mahoney said, charges now have been filed against two Decatur County men.

On Monday, Clerk of the District Court Janet Meitl said the cases weren't public record until the warrants have been

The felony charge is spelled out in the Kansas statue as knowingly or willingly capturing or killing wildlife for commercial purposes. That includes deer.

The five men were arrested in the Lyle area, in the northeast corner of the county near the Nebraska line. Jail records identified them as John Jacobs III, 53; Joseph R. Jacobs, 28; John Jacobs IV, 30; Mark G. Jacobs, 45; and Paul J. Jacobs, 26. The family is from De Pere, Wis.

They were released later that day on bonds totaling \$83,500, or \$16,700 each. The men had to come up with all of the bond money in cash, not the normal 10 percent, said Sheriff Ken Badsky.

While a first appearance was scheduled for 10 a.m. this morning in Decatur County District Court, Ms. Mahoney said a lawyer for one of the men had requested a continuance.

'Abnormal' dry weather not good for wheat

With 3 months of unseasonably dry weather and no end in sight, much of western Kansas is being listed under drought conditions.

The U.S. Drought Monitor at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln lists most of the county as under "abnormally dry" conditions, just a shade under moderate drought. The monitor lists most of western Kansas south of Norton County as under a moderate drought.

Moderate drought means the area has seen two to three inches less moisture than usual, the monitor says. (See drought.unl. edu/dm/DM_highplains.htm) The National Weather Service is pre-

dicting clear skies and only slight chances of snow Thursday night and Friday morning. The Drought Monitor says that the drought should increase in western Kansas through February. Thomas County Extension Agent Clint

Milliman said the area has been getting close to drought conditions for several months.

This is a critical time for the wheat crop, he said, because it hasn't gone dormant yet. Wheat goes dormant when the soil temperature gets below freezing every night, he said. Until then, the plants continue to grow and any moisture from rain or snow will soak into the unfrozen ground, helping the wheat establish good roots. If those roots aren't wellestablished, Milliman said, farmers will see a lot of the plants simply blow away over the winter.

Worse still, the dry weather may delay some wheat from sprouting, which will reduce yields.

"Anything that sprouts in the spring instead of fall will bring 50 to 60 percent

Decatur County kennel story attracts national attention

In the week since an application to dump nearly 1,200 dog carcasses in a central Kansas regional landfill became public, information about Jeff Fortin's kennel in Decatur County has been released by state and federal agencies and newspapers across the nation have picked

A quick online search shows the story in The Washington Post, New York Daily News, Los Angeles Times, Hays Daily News, Huffington Post, Lawrence Journal World, The Wichita Eagle and The Denver Post and on ABC and NBC affiliates, to name a few.

up the story.

Mr. Fortin returned calls from The Oberlin Herald last week but said he didn't want to give an interview until after talking with his lawyer and the state.

The story first came to light when a request was made to the Barton County Landfill to dump 1,200 euthanized dogs. The request apparently came because the landfill has a permit to take that kind

on land in Decatur County.

Mr. Witt mentioned the request for what he estimated at 33 tons of dog carcasses to his county administrator, who mentioned it in a Barton County commissioners' meeting last Monday. The dumping fee is \$34 a ton, he said,

so given the estimate, it would have cost \$1,122 plus a \$25 administrative fee to place them there. The landfill charges the fee on animal carcasses, said Mr. Witt, because they have to keep permanent records on that type of waste.

Last Wednesday, the day after the weekly Decatur County commissioners meeting, the county received a form and a letter from the state Department of Health and Environment asking for zoning approval for a site to dispose of dog carcasses. After discussion at the courthouse, the form was signed by Commissioner Ralph Unger with a statement from the state. that no county approval was needed.

A statement issued by the Kansas Animal Health Department says that the facility had been under quarantine twice since the middle of October with an outbreak of distemper. Throughout that time,

According to healthcommunities. com, "Canine distemper is a contagious, incurable, often fatal, multi systemic viral disease that affects the respiratory, gastrointestinal and central nervous systems. Distemper is caused by canine distemper

The department, which regulates and licenses kennels in the state, said that with the puppies under quarantine, the kennel owner had no income flow, so he wasn't able to maintain the work force, had difficulty in keeping proper sanitation and being able to keep the animals fed and watered.

"It was apparent the owner could not survive financially under these condi-
