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Norton sees economic advances

The group held its monthly meeting on Jan. 7 and Director Scott Sproul talked to the Norton County Commissioners about what his group has been doing on Jan. 17 and Monday.

There are several business expansion projects going on including work at the hospital and Ag Valley Co-op.

The hospital is progressing and as of Goodland's Northwest Tech this week. earlier in the month the masonry work was almost complete so that inside work could be done.

Mr. Sproul told the Norton County Commissioners on Monday that he has been working with the hospital and Colby Community College to get the old doctor's clinic for the college. The college's nursing program is especially important for the Norton area, he said, since there are students wanting to take the classes.

Norton County is going to sell a piece of Norton city's equipment.

McCook teenager is laid to rest Thursday

dead Friday night near Bartley, Neb., Clapp said her 18-year-old daughter saw about 15 miles east of McCook.

Kailee N. Clapp, a freshman at Mcmissing by her mother about 7:11 a.m. that day. According to a release from the McCook Police Department and Red Willow County Sheriff's Office, city officers investigated the report when they received information in the afternoon that Miss Clapp could be in danger.

A body was found near Bartley that evening, thought to be Miss Clapp, April Karnopp, Steven L. Berry, Joseph D. Durhan, Bill Unterseher and Rick pending.

> Stathis Kirkpatrick, 18, Bartley, is being held as a "person of interest" in the case. His bail is set at \$1 million with arraignment set for 11:30 a.m. Thursday.

A 14-year-old McCook girl was found day as she was getting ready for bed. Ms. Kailee an hour later.

"She was a very sweet, loving, ornery, Cook High School, had been reported loved girl," her mother said Saturday in an interview with an Associated Press reporter. "She was very friendly. She would be, like, the first person to make you her friend when you were the new person in school." A candle lit vigil was held for her
