In May of 2004, the World War II Memorial was finally completed and dedicated in Washington, D.C. and quickly became the topic of discussion among his World War II veteran patients.

The Red Cross would like to do another drive in Jennings or in one of the other small towns in the area in the future. They could schedule another one for next spring or summer if there is any interest. Ms. Gable also encourages everyone to consider donating in the larger Norton, Oberlin, or Hoxie drives. There must be at least 56 days between donations.
