

Development group dedicated to business City

Norton City/County Economic Development was established in 2005 after local leaders gathered to form a collaborative organization to promote economic development in Norton County.

They began by creating a five-year strategic plan which recognized the community's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. The end result identified three primary goals: job creation, downtown development and housing.

A new five-year strategic plan is being finalized and the primary goals remain the same:

Job Creation/Business Development and Retention: Some accomplishments toward these goals are the Ag Valley Grain Terminal project, the new Sleep Inn Hotel project, and the Norton City/County Economic Development Business Education Scholarship Program.

Downtown Development: In partnership with the Norton County Community Foundation, Norton Downtown Restoration Committee, City of Norton, and local civic groups, Norton City/County Economic Development is assisting with many projects underway to improve downtown Norton. Current projects include Moffet Station Business and Visitor Center, Dr. Lyons Historical House, and the Heaton Building renovation. With the recent Downtown Norton Historic District designation property owners will receive tax credits for approved renovations to their property.

Housing Development: The most significant accomplishment in housing so far is the Norton County Neighborhood Revitalization Plan passed by the Norton County Commission. This plan aims to incentivize property owners to rehabilitate existing property or construct new property (residential or commercial) by offering a decreasing tax rebate for the amount of the improvement. Norton City/County Economic Development is researching housing grant money to create innovating housing solutions in collaboration with government, private business and local citizens.

There are currently 19 business retention and expansion projects the office is involved in. The list includes a business relocating to Norton, assistance with business plans for several new or expanding businesses, matching investors with proposed new businesses, businesses for sale, building renovation plans and business incubator space in several communities.

The Norton City/County Economic Development office and the Norton Area Chamber of Commerce have joined forces to bring business expert, Cinda Baxter, to Norton County for a free marketing seminar on February 15th at 5:30 p.m. at the Norton American Legion. This is the first business seminar planned for 2011.

On January 28th the National Historical Society approved downtown Norton as a National Historic District. The State of Kansas approved the application on November 20th, 2010, designating Downtown Norton a state approved Historic District. With the addition of the National Historic Registry business owners that are wanting to renovate approved buildings in the district will be eligible for state and federal tax credits.

The Norton City/County Economic Development office should be the first stop for anyone who wants to start a new business or has an idea for a new business. The office is a valuable resource for business plan or funding assistance and has many partners who can help the entrepreneur.

Rob Lawson said he has estimated the cost for a separate entrance with handicapped accessibility and some walls to be \$4,083. The committee is considering utilizing part of the city owned building for the police department. The Finance committee will have further discussion on the use of the space.

Donna Foley reported on the Chamber breakfast. Brook Dix, the new Chamber Director was introduced at the breakfast. The Public Safety Committee discussed the code enforcement issues and will address the three large abatement projects each year in addition to smaller projects. She said the committee met Wotan, the newest member of the police department. Wotan is the department's drug sniffing dog.

She said that video cameras have been installed at the Recreation Center. The cameras will

increase security at the center. The Public Works Committee met with Holly Puga, Dennis Maybon and Jerry Jones regarding their ongoing drainage problems. Dennis and Holly will take steps on their own personal property to try to alleviate some of the problems. A motion was made and approved to have the Public Works crew proceed with checking with the County to address the drainage issues on the north side of Armory Drive.

Roberta Ryan reported that the Economic Development is having nationally known speaker, Cinda Baxter, come on Feb. 15 to the American Legion. This is a free seminar for all business owners.
