Baxter said she immediately realized that this would not fix the broken American economy but only send it into a worse tailspin.

Her message – it's OK to spend money. It's even OK to spend money with the Targets, Wal-Marts and Home Depots of this country, just remember they're not the only place you can get what you need.

"This whole message is positive," she told the Norton audience. "We tell people it's OK to go to big box stores. You need to balance your spending.

"It's not about them versus us," she said. "This needs to be a whole community approach."

Communities need to put a positive face on marketing and work together. Merchants should welcome every customer like they were the first person to walk in their door the first time they opened their door, she said.

Baxter said she never uses phrases like, "Shop at Home."

How many people consider a haircut as shopping, she asked. How about a trip to the cleaners or a visit from the plumber. These are not shopping experiences but they sure contribute to the community, she said.

"It's about you – the business owner, the consumer, the person who lives in Norton," she said. "It's about your quality of life."

For every \$100 spent in your community, she said, \$68 goes back into the local economy in the form of wages, taxes, supplies and money in the bank for lending to other businesses.
