# **BB** Gun team headed to State

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team will compete in the Kansas State BB Gun Championships on Saturday in Alma.

Norton BB Gun teams have won 38 of 45 state championships during the program's existence, including March 13, 2010 in Alma. They did not compete in the state shoot in 1982 because there was no Jaycees chapter that year to sponsor them.

The Norton Jaycees were the original sponsors but the Rotary Club is in the seventh year of sponsorship since the Jaycees chapter in Norton disbanded.

BB gun teams consist of young girls and boys from 8 to 14 years of age.

The three top teams in each shoot qualify to compete in the Daisy National BB Gun Championships, formerly the Daisy/ Jaycees International BB Gun Championships.

Norton has competed in 41 of the 45 international shoots and has also won eight international championships, more than any other team in the world!

The Norton County team was in the hunt again last year in placing ninth in the national shoot, which is the largest junior marksmanship competition in the world!

Three Norton teams will enter the state championships in Alma on Saturday and a top three finish would again guarantee Norton a spot in the national, which will be held again in Rogers, Ark., the home of Daisy, on Saturday and Sunday, July 2 and 3.

coach of the Yellow Team and is in his sixth year as head coach.

Shooting for the Blue Team this year will be: Evan Chambers, 12; Dylan Goss, 10; Miles Harrington, 10; Dallas Gosselin, 10; and Adson Day, 9. Alternate is Alecia Day, 8.

Marty Harrington is the coach of the Blue Team.

Members of the Red Team are: Stacie Elliott, 9; Shane Cozad, 9; Colton Mulder, 9; Riley Goss, 8; Greyson Tanner, 8.

There is no alternate marksman for the Red Team.

Coaches for the Red Team are Jeff Elliott and Ted Hull.

Trenton Sprague and Justis Posson were alternates on Norton's team which placed ninth at the national shoot last year in Rogers. James Berry shot last year as a member of the Norton team. Rules state that no shooter can compete in the national shoot in consecutive years but this rule does not include alternates, so Posson and Sprague are eligible this year if they qualify for the team but Berry is not.

All members of the Yellow Team and all members of the Blue Team, except Dallas Gosselin, have previous State Shoot experience.

On Saturday, coach Archer will be assisted by Jeana Yost, who is the classroom instructor.

Norton is associated with the beginning of the national gun safety program. It is based on a format proposed by the late Norton Jaycees member Duane Winder. This program was adopted nationwide when Daisy and the U.S. Jaycees began the program.

The program was designed to introduce young shooters to the basics of safe gun handling and marksmanship.

About 250,000 young people Cameron Archer returns as the take part in the program each

year.

"The community of Norton has supported this program because they know it passes on to the children and parents the proper safety knowledge of hunting," said coach Archer. "These youngsters have stepped it up in both the classroom and shooting through the years to become well known on the international and national level."

The winning performances of the Norton shooters at the state and national (formerly international) level have earned them an admirable reputation in marksmanship circles.

#### **State Shoot schedule**

The State Shoot will be hosted by the Kansas State Rifle Association and will be held in the Wabaunsee High School Gym on Saturday in Alma.

Opening ceremonies will be at 9 a.m.

Competition will begin with the written test from 9:15 to 10 a.m.A coaches meeting will also be held during this time.

Shooting from the prone position will be held from 10:15 to 11:45 a.m. Competition from the sitting position will be from 11:50 a.m. until 1:20 p.m. Kneeling position firing will be from 1:25 to 2:55 p.m. Shooting while

standing will be from 3 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Presentation of team and indi-

vidual awards will be around 5

p.m. There is no admission charge for the shoot.

**Practicing since October** 

Norton's preparation for the State Shoot began in mid-October when the shooters entered the gun safety program, sponsored by Daisy and the National Rifle Association.

The first night was a tryout night for youngsters to explore their interest in shooting a BB gun in competition and a number of potential shooters were recruited that night.

The youngsters had four weeks of classroom instruction from the Daisy 10-Lesson Curriculum Book.

After passing the gun safety course, the young girls and boys began practicing marksmanship from each of the four positions and studying for the written test.

Practices are held every Monday evening in the back of the Norton Rotary BB Gun Museum on East U.S. 36 Highway in Norton. Shooters are also encouraged to practice at home.

"Many thanks to the Norton Rotary Club for their unwavering support of our program and

team," said coach Archer.

"The museum building is really nice for a practice area and there's enough room to keep our targets set up all the time and a separate room for a classroom."

Coach Archer was asked how practices have been going for his young marksmen in preparation for the State Shoot.

"We have been working hard and shooting pretty well," said coach Archer.

"We've had two regional 4-H shoots and shot very well for our first shooting competitions, placing runner-up in both. I'm especially proud of how well our younger shooters are doing.

"Hopefully, the two regional shoots helped us get rid of any jitters and get ready for the pressure in the State Shoot.

"The important thing is our young people are learning gun safety for a lifetime.

"We are also proud of the sportsmanship shown by our shooters and the good behavior example that they set for other teams when they come to shoot."

The young marksmen's knowledge of gun safety is very important since the written test score is 20 percent of each shooter's final score.

"Under Jeana's guidance, our

youngsters have been studying possible written test questions and seem to be doing pretty well," said coach Archer.

#### Second generation shooters

As in the past, Norton has been involved in the BB gun program long enough that several shooters are second-generation marksmen.

Dalton Vanover's mother, Keri, was a shooter for the Norton squad and former Norton shooter Kim Hull is Miles Harrington's mother.

#### **BB** Gun Museum

A plaque in honor of the international BB gun program originator Duane Winder is in the BB Gun Museum on East U.S. 36 in Norton.

The Museum contains trophies, medals, newspaper articles and other memorabilia of the Norton shooting education program.

#### Shot gun winner

The Norton BB Gun Team held a drawing for a Remington 1187 Shot Gun as a fund raiser and the winner was Mark Leggett, Logan.

The shot gun was donated by the Longspur Pheasants Forever chapter.

The Victoria boys competed in Class 1A, Division I, and played No.1 seed Hanover in the first round. The Knights ended Hanover's season with a 22-2 record with a 55-53 upset. Victoria moved on to place fourth with a 66-61 loss to South Grav.
