Business in the Spotlight -March 2011

New Age Industrial Corpora-

Forty five years ago eight local businessmen got together to plan an expansion into manufacturing in Norton County. New Age Industrial Corporation came out of those meetings. The name originates from the founders' desire to bring new life to our economically struggling farm community. The basic idea was to start a "new age" of industry in rural Kansas.

Opening in 1966 in a 10,000 square-foot facility, the company has expanded with several building additions and now has a total of 180,000 square feet. Known in the food service industry as "the aluminum specialists", they make thousands of products from extruded aluminum including a variety of shelving, carts, tables, food service racks, cabinets, and dollies. In 2002 New Age added a powder coating service for their customers, enabling them to cover the base aluminum with over 1000 color choices. Their national client list continues to grow with food handling clients and retailers like Costco Warehouses, Target,

Keeping up with technology has also given them the edge in the market. According to Larry Nelson, one of the owners, new products are being added continuously because half of their business comes from custom orders.

New Age is one of Norton County's largest employers. There is low turnover at the company, in part, because the 113 employees are able to profit share and take ownership in their work output. The motto of the company has always been "Quality Service---Value". Hiring a younger workforce is something they are looking at as employees hired in the 1970's and '80's are beginning to think about retirement. The staff enjoys a company environment of stability, good benefits and a pay rate which allows them a good life.

One drawback to being in western Kansas is that the location causes higher freight rates for incoming materials and outgoing products. The aluminum market fluctuates with the national economy, and to some degree with the global economy.

No one was laid off during that time and everyone pulled together to bring new life to New Age. Working together works!

When Larry Nelson was asked recently what advice he would give someone starting a new business, he answered, "Get a good banking relationship from the beginning." Larry shared the best advice he ever received. "Take care of your customer or someone else will. Take pride in quality work." He was asked why he ever wanted to be a business owner in a small town. Nelson then told a story about how in 1970 an investment professor told him that he should be financially a part of any business he chose. "If you plan to work in a field for any length of time, invest in the business and own your future". This is certainly good advice from one of the owners of a very successful manufacturing complex.
