School board talks energy, fire compliance

USD 211 Board of Education was held to discuss energy needs of the schools, the fire marshal compliance issues at the Chemistry Room in Norton Community High School, negotiations and non-elected personnel. In a special meeting other items not on the agenda cannot be added.

The board held a discussion on the various projects that have been proposed by 360 Energy Solutions. Seven projects were approved at an estimated cost of \$1,115,000. Savings are projected to be \$64,000 the first year.
