Terrell was chosen by the Kansas news media as one of 34 players on the West team which will compete against the East squad of Kansas senior football players in the annual game on Saturday, July 30 at Lewis Field Stadium in Hays.

Terrell is a 5'11", 220 pound tailback, defensive back for the Norton Blue Jay football team. A four-year letterman, the shifty, hard-running Terrell has received All-Mid-Continent League recognition all four years, as well. He was a unanimous selection by league coaches this season.

Terrell was also a first team choice in Class 3A by the large daily newspapers as well as the Kansas High School Football Coaches Association.

He had a super senior season for the 9-1 Blue Jays. He rushed for 1,768 yards on 148 carries for an average of 11.95 yards per carry and rushed for 26 touchdowns. This season, he gained 2,278 allpurpose yards since he returned punts and kickoffs.

During his four-year career, Terrell ran for 5,011 yards and rushed for 59 touchdowns!

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Norton BB Gun team takes sixth at State 4-H

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team placed sixth out of 12 teams in the State 4-H Shooting Match held Saturday, April 16 in Great Bend.

The Norton County marksmen have already qualified for the Daisy National BB Gun Championships to be held Fourth of July weekend in Rogers, Ark. with a third place finish in the State BB Gun Championships in Alma, which are hosted by the Kansas State Rifle Association.

They competed in the 4-H State Shoot after earlier qualifying in the Regional 4-H Shoot. Having already qualified for the Daisy National BB Gun Championships, they competed in this shoot as a practice shoot.

"A gun problem and a different shooting schedule for our young marksmen contributed to our lower than normal shooting scores," said Norton BB Gun Team head coach Cameron Archer.

"We can and will shoot better in the national shoot."

Riley-Pottawatomie Counties won the championship with a total shooting score from the prone, standing, sitting and kneeling positions of 1846. They were followed by Phillips-Rooks Counties, 1827; Wyandotte, 1824; Jefferson County, 1811; Wabaunsee, 1793; Norton, 1783; Sedgwick, 1769; Jackson-Nemaha Counties, 1768; Johnson, 1668; Lyons, 1666; Edwards, 1651; Harvey,

James Berry had the best shooting score for Norton, recording a 373, followed by Dalton Vanover, kneeling, total score 314; Dylan 369; Trenton Sprague, 359; Cameron Heikes, 346; Scott Sansom,

Berry had the sixth highest shooting score of all the marksmen and Vanover's score was 13th best.

Individual shooting scores of Norton marksmen were: James Berry, 96 prone; 91 standing; 90 sitting; 96 kneeling; Cameron Heikes, 90 prone; 70 standing; 98, sitting; 88 kneeling; Trenton Sprague, 94 prone; 84 standing; 92 sitting; 89 kneeling; Dalton Vanover, 97 prone; 90, standing; 90 sitting; 92 kneeling; Scott Sansom, 89 prone; 79 standing; 88 sitting; 80 kneeling.

Also competing for Norton and their scores were: Adson Day, 91 prone, 67 standing; 84 sitting, 72 Goss, 89 prone, 79 standing; 87, sitting; 83 kneeling, total score, 338; Dallas Gosselin, 91 prone, 79 standing; 76 sitting; 87 kneeling, total score 333.

Norton's Berry had the second best score in kneeling, sixth best in standing, 10th best in prone and was sixth overall in aggregate score.

Heikes was second best in sitting and Vanover was fourth best in prone and eighth best in standing.

There are no written tests in 4-H shoots.

A total of 173 marksmen between 8 and 14 years of age competed in the shoot.

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
