Commissioner Miller suggested that the department lock in the price for the oil for all three projects, so that the county will know what it costs no matter what happens to the price.

In other business, the commissioners last Monday:

- Asked Richard to double check the accuracy of a bid for two doors with windows for the county shop.
- Discussed a bid of \$22,675 from Roy's Sales and Service for a new 15-foot roadside mower without a sprayer attachment.

The commissioners thought that a sprayer would probably be more of a problem than an aid but suggested Richard check with out counties that had one and see how they like it.

- Talked about oil field production and the problems that drilling causes for the county's roads as well as the tax value to the county from the wells.
- Heard that Commissioner Miller went to Topeka last week to talk to the legislature about cuts to the community corrections and the prison system. This would include sending some prisoners back to the county jails.

Norton School Board waives fees for summer building use

A request was made to the Unified School District 211's Board of Education at the regular meeting of the Board on May 9 to waive fee and insurance requirements for building usage for the summer athletic activities sponsored by the Norton coaching staffs and conducted according to the guidelines of Kansas State High School Activities Association.

During the summer, coaches and sponsors conduct several camps and activities for, primarily, Norton students. The Kansas State High School Activities Association allows coaches in

grades 7-12 who direct a Kansas State High School Activities Association sponsored sport to have a team camp during the summer months.

The high school volleyball and basketball coaches requested an "open gym" this summer to allow their students to practice their shooting and ball handling skills (under the rules of the Kansas State High School Activities Association). The coaches also organize and conduct the Blue Jay Sports camps for grade school students.

The Norton coaches have already obtained permission to undertake and organize these

activities.

The school board was requested to waive the fees and insurance requirements for these activities since they are conducted predominantly for Norton students and are overseen by Norton coaches.

A motion was made and approved by the Board to waive the fees and insurance for building usage for the summer athletic activities sponsored by the coaching staff and conducted under the guidelines of Kansas State High School Activities Association.
