States and Tribes, a group which represents the interests of state governments and Native Americans in the world's third-largest river basin.

Board members of the seven states are their chief water engineers and wildlife executives, so he's familiar with the group.

He'll be replacing David Pope, who had been Kansas' water engineer. The office will move from Topeka to his current hometown, Lawrence.

"I'm looking forward to it," he said. "It involves a lot of preservation of natural resources."

He noted that he had been governor in 1987 when the former Norton State Hospital, a tuberculosis sanitarium, was about to close.
