## RESOLUTION NO. 2011-7

### A RESOLUTION INITIATING THE PROCESS OF DECLARING CERTAIN ROADS WITHIN NORTON COUNTY, KANSAS, “MINIMUM MAINTENANCE ROADS” AND NOTICE OF HEARING THEREON

WHEREAS, a proposal has been received by the Board of County Commissioners of Norton County, Kansas, suggesting that certain roads be declared “minimum maintenance roads,” and  
 WHEREAS, K.S.A. 68-5, 102 sets forth a procedure for declaring roads as “minimum maintenance roads,” and  
 WHEREAS, the roads in question are described as follows:  
 Road W7 from Road N to Road O, being the County road lying between Sections 9 and 10 of Township 3 South, Range 24 West of the 6th P.M.  
 Road CC from Center Road to Road W1, being the County road lying between Sections 22 and 27 of Township 5 South, Range 23 West of the 6th P.  
 Road DD from Center Road to Road W1, being the County road lying between Sections 27 and 34 of Township 5 South, Range 23 West of the 6th P.M.  
 Road W1 from Road CC to Road DD, being the County road lying between Sections 27 and 28 of Township 5 South, Range 23 West of the 6th P.M.  
 Road DD from midpoint of said road between Road W1 and W2 West to Road W2, being the County road lying between the SW/4 of Section 28, Township 5 South, Range 23 West of the 6th P.M. and the NW/4 of Section 33, Township 5 South, Range 23 West of the 6th P.M.  
 AND, WHEREAS, a hearing should be held to receive testimony and evidence from anyone regarding the determination to be made by the Board.  
 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Norton County, Kansas, that a hearing before the Board shall be held on the 13th day of June, 2011, at 9:00 o’clock a.m. in the Commissioners’ Chambers, Second Floor, Norton County Courthouse, Norton, Kansas, to determine whether the above-described roads should be declared “minimum maintenance roads” by the Board.  
 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall be published one (1) time in the official County newspaper.  
 ADOPTED this 23 day of May, 2011.

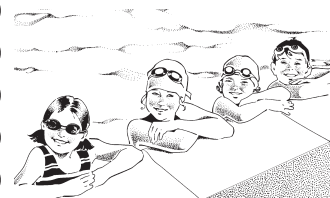
