County worried by old plumbing

The Norton County Courthouse sprung a leak last month and the County Commissioners are concerned about plumbing in the old building.

The water leak, which caused plaster to fall and wreaked havoc in both the second floor bathrooms and the appraiser's office, was found when people entered the courthouse to use the facilities during the Relay for

The county was lucky that someone came into that part of the courthouse over the weekend, County Clerk Robert Wyatt told the commissioners during their meeting on May 23. If the Relay for Life hadn't been taking place and people hadn't gone into the courthouse, the

leak would not have been found until Monday and a lot more damage would have occurred.

As it was, the water was turned off and the leak located and repaired. However, because the broken pipe was behind a wall, the repairs required that part of a wall Miller noted. taken down before repairs could be made.

This is at least the second time in recent years that this type of leak has occurred, he said.

What are we going to do about this water?" Commissioner John Miller asked.

"I don't know," Wyatt answered. "It makes you wonder what it did to the wiring and all."

Besides the falling plaster, the water has obviously allowed mold to grow behind the walls.

"It stinks in there," Wyatt noted.

The problem is the courthouse is old and the pipes are all behind the walls. Wyatt said that he thought the whole building needs to be checked for bad pipes.

"We've been lucky on this pipe thing," Commissioner

"I don't see going through the whole courthouse and digging out all the walls," Commissioner Carolyn Applegate said.

'What worries me is I think we're just starting," Wyatt explained. "We have a 100-year-old building here and the pipes are just not accessible."


