
Twenty - One Gun Salute

Northwest projects selected for aviation funding

Thirty projects that will enhance safety and service at public use airports in the state have been selected for funding under the 2012 Kansas Airport Improvement Program (KAIP).

Eight communities in Northwest Kansas, including Quinter - where Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) Director Ed Young announced the projects today - will receive some of the \$3.54 million in funding for the projects made possible by T-WORKS, the transportation program passed by the Kansas Legislature last May. With local funds of approximately \$714,000, the total infrastructure investment will be \$4.25 million.

The following Northwest Kansas communities and their grant award amounts are: Bird City -Airfield maintenance equipment, \$15,750; Colby–Upgrade airport weather observation system, \$36,537; Lucas – Repair and seal airfield pavements, \$29,412; Norton – Replace beacon, \$26,550; Quinter – Site selection study, \$38,000; St. Francis – Repair and seal ramp and taxiways, \$36,000; Smith Center – Airspace protection planning, \$31,616; Trego County/WaKeeney-Design runway reconstruction, \$37,620 and reconstruct and widen runway, \$1,200,000 (two projects).

"Last year we released a study that showed Kansas airports support more than 47,000 jobs, generate \$2.3 billion in payroll and produce \$10.4 billion in on-airport economic activity," said Ed Young. "With that kind of impact, it's not only important to maintain our aviation infrastructure, but to ensure that our investments match the needs of our system plan.

The projects will address maintenance, runway, facility and equipment needs at airports in Kansas

The KDOT's Division of Aviation, which manages the program, received 114 project applications for projects totaling approximately \$31.6 million. Both the applications and the total requested funding were the most ever received by KDOT.

Under guidelines of the program, project sponsors are required to pay a minimum of 10 percent of the total project costs, up to a maximum of 50 percent based on population.

In addition to the Northwest Kansas projects, the following communities/counties have also been selected for funding: Topeka, Hillsboro, Lincoln, Salina, Fort Scott, Ottawa, Parsons, Pittsburg, El Dorado, Greensburg, Great Bend, Hutchinson, Kinsley, La Crosse, Oxford, Wellington, Satanta, Syracuse and Tribune.

ANSEN MUSEUM

Dane G. Hansen Museum, Logan, is proud to present "The Curious World of Patent Models" scheduled to open July 8 and run through Aug. 28. This exhibit will show approximately 50 models with interpretive labels that will include the history of each individual patent and the inventor.

Established in 1790 by Thomas Jefferson, the U.S. Patent Office required inventors to submit a working, scale model of their invention with their application. These models were usually no larger than 12 square inches and range from intricately crafted miniature weaving looms to common swing sets. This continued through the Industrial Revolution, but later ceased when the U.S. Patent Office no longer had room to store the models.

Most of the models in this collection were made by professional model makers and are more than 130 years old. The oldest model in the Rothschild Collection is from 1809 and is maintained in perfect working order. Some of these models were produced and sold while others made it no farther than the patent model stage.
