## Norton High track teams bring home the hardware

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Twelve Norton Community High School girls and boys competed in the 101st Kansas State Track & Field Championships on Friday and Saturday in Cessna Stadium in Wichita.

The nine Lady Jays in the competition scored 18 points to tie for 13th out of 36 teams in Class 3A and the three Norton boys participating scored 14 points to finish 18th in Class 3A.

The top four finishers in all events in the four regional meets the week before qualified to compete at the Kansas State Meet, the largest high school track meet in the nation! Over 3,500 athletes competed in the meet.

Rossville was the 3A girls champion with 64 points and Thomas More Prep-Marian was runner-up with 53. Tying for third place with 49 points were Wichita-Independent and Douglass. Fifth place went to Conway Springs with 34, followed by Marysville, 30; Garden Plain, 25 and Smith Center, Sabetha and Minneapolis, tied for eighth with 24. Rock Creek was 11th with 22 points and Southwestern Heights was 12th with 21.

Tying with Norton for 13th were Richmond-Central Heights and Hoisington.

Beloit was 21st with 9 points, Scott City and Riley County each tallied 3 points to tie for 29th with three other schools.

In the 3 Aboys division, Hutchinson Trinity won the championship with 69 points, Scott City was runner-up with 51, Riley County third with 37, Conway Springs fourth with 35 and Phillipsburg fifth with 34. Minneapolis tied for tenth with Hoisington with 20 each, Beloit tied for 16th with Galena with 16 points each. Goodland was in 20th with 11 points.

The Northern Valley boys placed seventh in Class 1A with 28 points. Centralia was the champion with 68 points, Pretty Prairie was runner-up with 46 and Moscow just behind in third with 45 points.

The Cheylin boys tied for 17th with Thunder Ridge and St. John with 12 points. Logan tied for 20th with South Gray and Caldwell with 10 points. Wheaton, Hoxie and Pleasanton tied for 23th with 8 points. Quinter scored 4 to tie with Sharon Springs and Cunningham for 32nd.

The Olpe girls won the 1A championship with 43.5 points and Victoria was runner-up with 38. Hoxie placed tenth with 21, Thunder Ridge tied for 20th with Coldwater with 13 points each. Quinter tied for 25th with Madison with 10 points each.

## **GIRLS**


Norton's 4 x 800 meter relay team, which placed fourth with a school record time in the regional meet a week earlier, finished third in the state meet with a clocking of 10:14.04. Running on the foursome were freshman Bailey Ambrosier, junior Astrid Moen, sophomore Kamilla Jones and best clocking of 12:11.25. senior Dustyna Sprigg.

Norton's 4 x 400 meter relay team of junior Erin Terrell, Ambrosier, Sprigg and freshman Katelyn Engelbert also had a great meet. After qualifying for the finals with a personal record timing of 4:11.11 on Friday, they set another personal best with a clocking on Saturday of 4:09.75 to place fourth. They finished just over a half second behind third place Marysville!

The Lady Jays also earned points in the shot put where sophomore Teslee Nickell placed fourth with a heave of 36'4".

"It was good to see Teslee earn a fourth place medal in the state meet," said coach Jones.

Sophomore Alec Melvin qualified for the state meet in three events but did not medal. Her results were: 99'1", discus, 11th; 105'4", javelin, 12th; 30'2", shot put, 14th.

The three Norton boys who competed in the state meet all medaled, two of them in the pole

Junior Seth Antrim was the runner-up in the pole vault with a clearance of 13' and freshman Austin Hager placed sixth with a height of 12'.

In the running events, junior Jacob Brooks placed sixth in the 200 meter dash preliminaries on Friday with a time of 23.69, then came back in Saturday's finals to place fourth in 23.07. Dalton Smith of Scott City edged him by nine hundredths of a second for third and Jacob was only half a second out of first!

"We're happy that all three boys earned medals in the state meet," said coach Jones.
