She graduated from Dardanelle High School in 1941 and from the Arkansas State Teachers College in Conway (now the University of Central Arkansas) in 1945 with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology and chemistry.

She married Buford Marcel Desilet in Dardanelle in 1945 and the couple moved to Concordia, where she lived the rest of her life. With a severe shortage of teachers in the early 1950s, she started teaching first in country schools and then, after consolidation in the 1960s, at Notre Dame High School and Our Lady of Perpetual Help Grade School.

After the closing of the Catholic schools, she taught at the Concordia Middle School, retiring after 32 years. She was a member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church, the Catholic Daughters and the American Legion Auxiliary. She moved to Mount Joseph after suffering a stroke about eight



Petunias are dazzling

It's not often that this "vegetable garden lover" goes off the deep end and writes about flowers. I mean, what kind of a gardener wants to plant something you can't eat? Why spend all that time weeding, watering, and bug watching, trying to grow something you can only look at? Believe me when I tell you that there are more flower gardeners out there than there are vegetable gardeners. Actually, just about all those who grow vegetables also plant a few flower seeds, or set out a few flowering transplants. But there are thousands of flower gardeners out there who prefer to spend their time and money ONLY on projects that help beautify their home setting, neighborhood, and community.

As in vegetable gardening, the flower gardening industry is changing. Never before in our lifetime have we seen such an influx of beautiful, newly developed, colorful flowers that are available now. And while the choices of sizes, colors, and growing habits is almost endless, Americans seemingly have settled on petunias as the flower they plant most.

The petunia!!....not a gorgeous grouping of gaillardias, not a row of rudbeckia, not even a bed of begonias. It's the dazzling display of new colors and the cascading, mounding effect of the many offerings of the Wave petunias, and the newer exciting series of Supertunias that are now seen in most flower gardeners' beds, in their borders, and in their patio containers and hanging baskets. All over the nation, flower lovers have seemed to embrace the petunia.

They are simply unbelievable! Supertunias, including the Vista Bubble Gum, are highly recommended by Dr. Alan Stevens and his Prairie Star series of annuals, tested for several years now at several different sites in Kansas, including the Colby Research Farm.

Petunias are just beautiful, and so easy to grow.

Your flower gardeners in Goodland may want to plant a few Phantom variety of petunia, new this year. It too is very pretty, with a huge gold star, on a black velvet background. The school colors never looked better. Burpee has them available in plant form. Colby gardeners may want to avoid them.
