Norton County designated as Natural Disaster Area

has designated Norton and surrounding counties as primary natural disaster areas due to losses of wheat and forage crops caused by drought, excessive heat and high winds that occurred from Jan. 1, and continuing. Those counties affected are Norton, Phillips and Graham.

"Assistance at this point and time is critically important for Kansas producers, especially in helping them keep their farmland healthy for the remainder of the year," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "President Obama and I realize that during this time of disaster, federal assistance will be needed until conditions improve as farmers strive to recover their losses."

Farmers and ranchers in Decatur, Rooks and Sheridan also qualify for natural disaster assistance because their counties are contiguous.

These counties were designated natural disaster areas June 23 making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from United States Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible

The United States Department of Agriculture counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. Farm Service Agency will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Farm Service Agency has a variety of programs, in addition to the emergency loan program to help eligible farmers recover from adversity.

United States Department of Agriculture also has made other programs available to assist farmers and ranchers, including the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), which was approved as part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008; the Emergency Conservation Program; Federal Crop Insurance; and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. Interested farmers may contact their local United States Department of Agriculture Service Centers for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for these and other programs. 

Norton BB Gun Museum

The museum displays the rich history of the Norton shooting education and marksmanship program. Norton has won the state championship 38 times, more than any other Kansas community. In recent years, the Kansas 4-H has also sponsored BB gun shooting teams and the top three in their state shoot also qualify for what has in recent years, with the absence of teams from other nations, become the national shoot.

information about their service calls. "We do a 10-point check at each service call and plug that information into the computer," Patterson said. "We can also plug in test results like the contents of a septic tank and the program sets up a maintenance contract and schedule for us. We are the only

company using this program to provide septic services."

Since opening in March, Patterson has been in the process of renovating a set of three adjoined spaces at 111 South Second Street in Norton. The building, incorporating three separate spaces, has been fitted with a new roof and over the coming months, the

spaces will become an office/shop area, a public use area with offices, and a warehouse and showroom for tanks and equipment.

A perfect score on the written test would be 20 percent of the total possible points in the shoot. The written test can make or break a team. Norton always concentrates on the written test during practices.

Began in October

Norton's preparation for regional, state and national shoots began in October when the shooters entered the gun safety program, sponsored by Daisy and the National Rifle Association. After passing the course, they began practicing marksmanship and studying for the written test.

The program was designed to introduce young shooters to the basics of safe gun handling and marksmanship. About 250,000 young people take part in the program each year. The safety program is based on a format proposed by the late Norton Jaycees member Duane Winder. It was adopted nationwide when Daisy and the U.S. Jaycees began the program.

"The community has supported this program because they know it passes on to the children and parents the proper safety knowledge of hunting," said coach Archer.

"These youngsters have stepped it up in both the classroom and shooting since the state shoots. They'll do the best they can and will make a strong showing."
