The Dane G. Hansen Museum, Logan, is proud to present the "The Curious World of Patent Models", which opened July 8 and will run through August 28. This exhibit, organized by the Rothschild Patent Model Collection and put on display by Smith Kramer Fine Art Services, will show approximately 50 models with interpretive labels that will include the history of each individual patent and the inventor. Most of the models in this collection were made by professional model makers and are more than 130 years old.

A patent is a government-issued document that protects an invention or idea for up to twenty years. This gives the inventor the opportunity to produce and sell the invention - or license others to do so – and to make a profit. And while "patent model" may not be a familiar term today, to U.S. inventors between 1790 and the late 1800's, it was commonplace. In order to obtain a patent, an application had to be accompanied by a working model of the invention. These were called "patent models," and were generally no larger than 12 inches square. The regulation was ceased when the U.S. Patent Office no longer had room to store the models.

Today, there are more than seven million patents, but applicants now submit only written specifications and diagrams of their inventions. Most of the early patent models have been destroyed or lost, purchased by collectors, or donated to museums, including the Smithsonian Institution.

Youth hunters must be accompanied by an adult who may assist with scouting, stalking and game retrieval but may not participate in the actual harvest.

A series of soil tests will be performed at three bridge locations along US-36 Highway, starting next Monday, Aug. 8.

Workers with Palmerton & Parrish, Inc. of Springfield, Miss. will be drilling through the roadway and obtaining soil samples at the bridge-approaches near milemarkers 84.3, 86.1, and 88.9 (between Oberlin and Norcatur).

The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) will be performing the traffic control during daylight hours. Flaggers will guide one-lane traffic through the work zones during daylight hours. Delays of 15 minutes or less will be expected throughout the testing timeframe.

Please use caution, pay atten-



tion to the work zone signs, and respect workers when driving through any road work zone. Slow down and "Give 'Em A Break".

The testing is being done in preparation for the three bridge replacements, to occur in 2013 or 2014.
