Heavy rain brings minor flooding

After steady rainfall beginning Friday night and lasting through the weekend, areas of Norton County saw as much as six inches of rain over the weekend, causing some minor flooding across the county.

Severe thunderstorms Friday night led the way for a weather system to drop several inches of rain Friday evening through Sunday evening. The National Weather Service office in Goodland reports that some of the heaviest rain was recorded in the Lenora area, which saw as much as six inches of rain over the weekend. The extreme precipitation over a short time led local officials to barricade off portions of roadways over the weekend. Norton County Road and Bridge Supervisor Sandy Smith reported Monday that portions of Roads E9 and Road W2 in the Lenora area were blocked off Saturday because water was running over the roads, but preliminary observations indicate that the damage and washout from the water is mini-

Parts of Elmwood Park in Norton were left under several feet of standing water Saturday afternoon, which covered part of the playground equipment and some small walking bridges throughout the park. No damage estimates were available Monday afternoon from the flooding.

The National Weather Service reports that an observation sight at the dam at Sebelius Reservoir recorded

just under 5.4 inches of rain over the weekend and an observation sight several miles north of Norton recorded 5.25 inches of rain.

Now that the weather front has moved out of the area, the National Weather Service forecast calls for sunny skies and seasonally-normal temperatures for the rest of week and into the weekend.

Fire Prevention Week theme has been announced for year

The National Fire Protection Association announced recently the theme for Fire Prevention Week -Protect Your Family From Fire. Fire Prevention Week will be held Oct. 9-15. The Association has sponsored the fire prevention campaign since 1922, spreading awareness of the dangers of fires and inspiring individuals to prevent the deaths, injuries, and destruction they cause. This year's theme focuses on how to protect your family from fire by planning ahead and integrating simple things into your everyday life.

Fires in the home take a great toll on life and property each year. During the five-year-period from 2005-2009, the Association estimates that U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 373,900 reported home structure fires per year. These fires caused an estimated average of 2,650 civilian deaths, 12,890 civilian injuries, and \$7.1 billion in direct property damage per year. Smoking materials remain

the leading cause of home fire deaths, while cooking equipment is the leading cause of home structure fires and home fire injuries.

Installing systems such as smoke alarms and residential fire sprinklers, as well as identifying potential hazards, can reduce the risk of home fires and property loss, injury or death due to fire. Nearly two-thirds of home structure fire deaths occur in homes where there was no smoke alarm, or where smoke alarms were present but failed to operate.

The Association has taken the lead in public fire safety outreach by serving as the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for 89 years. The annual public awareness and safety commemoration, which is proclaimed by the President of the United States each year, is observed by fire departments in the U.S. and Canada to mark the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871.
