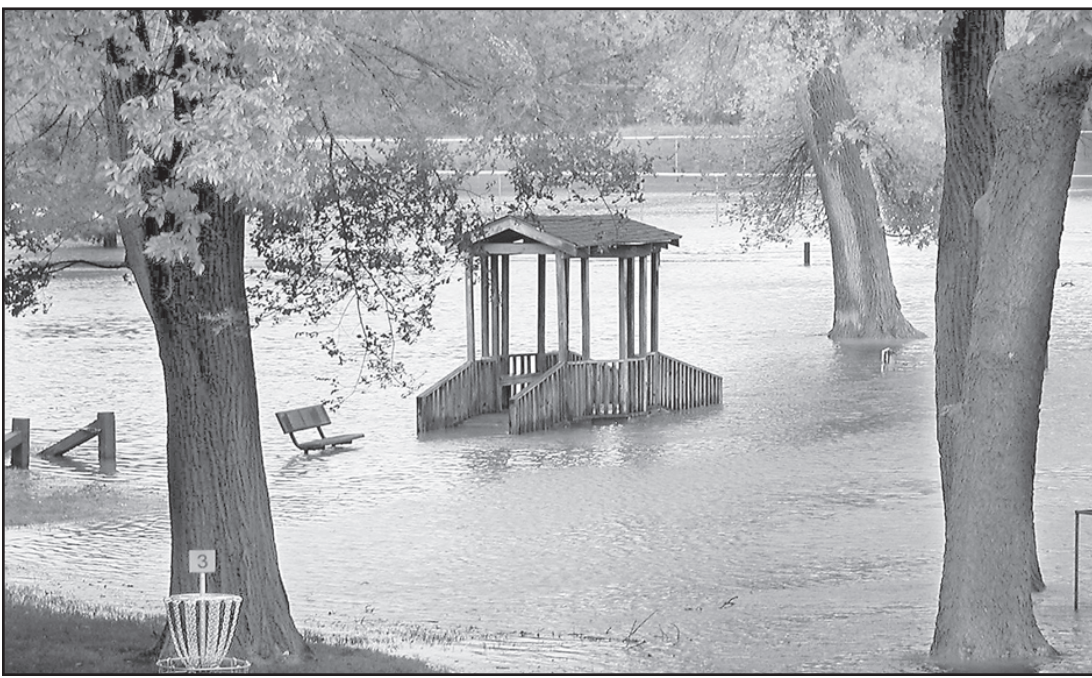


# Water, water everywhere

## Norton City-Wide Clean-Up

Fall Clean-up is a **free** service provided by the City of Norton. If residents take items to the landfill themselves, normal county fees will apply.

### MONDAY — WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24, 25 AND 26

City Trucks will make special trash pickup on these days.

All items **MUST** be out at the curb by 8 a.m. on your **regular route day**.

All types of trash will be picked up on your regular trash route day **EXCEPT** yard waste, tires and household hazardous waste. Yard waste will be picked up on your regular yard waste route day, and must be in a solid container. There will be a \$10.00 charge per item for appliances with freon. Tree limbs must be cut no longer than 8 feet long. Fireplace ash must be in plastic bags. E-waste (computers, phones, microwaves, stereos, TVs, DVDs, VCRs) **WILL NOT BE** picked up, and should be taken directly to the landfill by the property owner.

The maximum limit the City will pick up at each residence is (1) load of household items and (1) load of tree limbs. Normal household trash will be picked up in the usual manner.

**SPECIAL NOTE:** TRASH MUST BE SEPARATED, i.e., tree limbs from metals, etc. because they are disposed of in different locations at the landfill. Mattresses and furniture need to be separate from other trash. Hazardous waste such as paint, motor oil, batteries, pesticides, poisons, caustic chemicals, etc. **WILL NOT** be picked up and should be taken by owners directly to the county landfill.

**NOTE:** Yard waste pickup will continue on Wednesday/Thursday until a later date. Recyclables will continue to be picked up on Fridays.
