In recognition of his leadership and dedication to his career, a Norton school district administrator has recently been named the Area Five Mid Level Principal of the Year by the Kansas Associa-

tion of Secondary School Principals. The Association announced that Jeff Wallingford, Principal of Norton Junior High, was awarded the distinction from a peer nomination and chosen as an honoree through the Association's

selection process. Norton Superintendent Greg Mann nominated Wallingford for the honor, citing the Principal's leadership and innovative thinking in his position since joining the district in the fall of 2008.

"Mr. Wallingford is very compassionate for his students and he's very organized in the way he leads the middle school," Mann said. "He is a consensus-builder and a solid decision-maker and he's just a good role model for his students and his peers."

Each year, the Kansas Association of Secondary School Principals takes nominations and chooses three school administrators from each of the six regions in Kansas to honor as Principals of the Year.

With Wallingford's recognition, all three current Principals in the Norton district have earned the honor. Rudy Perez (Norton Community High School) and Corey Roy (Eisenhower Elementary) both earned the recognition in 2009.

Wallingford said he was humbled by the nomination and honor.

"It's nice to be recognized, but I don't do what I do for these kinds of things," he said. "It's nice and I'm truly humbled by it, but I'm not in this for the rewards."

## Group aims to clean up the United States

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In an age where good deeds and concern for the world can be hard to find, a small group of volunteers are doing their part to clean up the world – one mile at a time.

A group of six full-time volunteers, mostly college graduates, are walking across the United States to clean up road-

side litter as part of the Pick Up America program.

The group of volunteers passed through Norton Thursday and Friday on Highway 36, picking up garbage along the

Pick Up America's Public Relations Director Greg Katski explained Friday that the group got started when Jeff Chen, a former student of the University of Maryland, was working as a summer intern in Yosemite National Park. Chen was hiking on the famous Half Dome trail in the park and found substantial litter along the trail.

"Jeff was thinking that if there was so much litter in a cherished place like Yosemite, how much trash there must be across the nation," Katski said. "He got the idea to try to clean some of it up."

Chen took the idea back to his friends at the University of Maryland and a few months later, founded Pick Up America with fellow student Davey Rogner.

In March 2010, a group of volunteers took off walking across the nation from the east coast of Maryland and over the course of 32 months, intend to walk all the way to San Francisco, Calif., picking up garbage all along the way. The trip is expected to end in San Francisco by November 2012.

Since March 2010, volunteers have walked from Maryland to western Kansas and when the group gets to Denver, Colo., the project will be put on hold until next spring. Since leaving Maryland, volunteers have walked more

than 1,700 miles and gathered about 144,000 pounds of gar-The volunteers leave bags of garbage they collect along

the road and state Department of Transportation crews pick up the bags along the way. Whenever possible though, the volunteers recycle as much of the garbage as possible. The Pick Up America volunteers aren't just about clean-

ing up the nation, though. Katski explained that part of the purpose is to get people thinking about a "zero-waste" world
