\*Variation of viscosity (thickpumpkin and squash products is ness) of pumpkin purees do not allow standard calculations for recipes as far as processing times, and.

pumpkin butter or puree, thaw it in the refrigerator, store it in the refrigerator and use it within one week. Freezer storage can be for up to six months.


