## It's time to bake cookies

Snowy weather always inspired me to bake cookies and make soup perhaps because extra warmth was welcome when cold weather came along. In case cold weather also draws you to the kitchen, here are recipes for pretty cookies to add variety to holiday cookie trays.

Hartzen are a traditional German cookie served at Christmas. Do not use powdered spices in this recipe because the bits of crushed cinnamon stick and nutmeg add a necessary texture to a very simple but delicious cookie. May be kept covered a few days if they last that long!

#### **HARTZEN**

Two to three cups flour

One cup white sugar One quarter cup butter

One quarter teaspoon salt One teaspoon fresh grated nutmeg

One cinnamon stick crushed in bits

Two cups sour cream

One teaspoon baking soda

Dissolve baking soda in sour cream and set aside. Mix one cup flour, butter, salt, spices as for pastry. Add sour cream and work in enough more flour to form a stiff dough. Cover and chill overnight. Roll chilled dough half an inch thick on a floured board and cut into half inch wide strips. On an ungreased cookie sheet form each strip into a heart shape and brush lightly with beaten egg yolk. Bake at 375F just until light brown, six to eight minutes, remove immediately to waxed paper to cool.

#### SPEARMINT DIAMONDS

Two cups brown sugar Four eggs

Two cups flour

One teaspoon baking powder Half cup walnuts, chopped

One pound of spearmint leaf gumdrops, cut in tiny pieces

Beat eggs and sugar together, add flour and baking powder, then nuts and candy pieces. This is a very sticky dough. Get your hands wet, dump the dough onto a 16x20 jelly roll pan and

press evenly into all the corners and out to edges. Bake at 375F for twenty minutes. Allow to remain on sheet while you stir up three tablespoons cream and half cup powdered sugar with a drop or two of mint extract to make a thin frosting to spread on warm slab. Cut into diamond shapes by making angled cuts across the slab. Remove quickly to racks or they will stick. Can also be made with a pound of orange slice gumdrops or mixed color spice gum drops with frosting made with orange or lemon juice. Store in covered container. Number of cookies depends on how narrow you cut

the diamond shapes. MICROWAVE CHIPSTERS One cup milk chocolate and toffee chips, mixed

One can sweetened condensed

One cup chunky peanut but-

Two cups plain potato chips, scrunched

One cup chopped peanuts

In a two-quart glass measuring cup combine peanut butter, chocolate and toffee chips with the sweetened condensed milk. Microwave on high setting two minutes, remove and stir well, microwave another two minutes. Remove from heat and stir

in potato chips and peanuts. Mix well. Butter a foil-lined 8x8 pan and press the hot mixture firmly into it. Chill two hours, lift out by foil edges and turn onto a cutting board. Peel off foil and cut into small squares. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

They won't last long! This recipe can be made without tequila but it will not be the Real McCoy served at Mexican fiestas. Not quite like your mama used to make but oh so

#### **ORIGINAL MEXICAN** WEDDING COOKIES

Half a cup powdered sugar, sifted twice

Two cups soft butter (not

Two tablespoons good tequila One teaspoon real vanilla ex-

One fourth teaspoon salt Almost three cups flour

Half cup chopped pecans Additional powdered sugar for rolling

Work butter and first powdered sugar together until very smooth; add the tequila and vanilla extract. Sift salt and flour together and work it into the butter mixture until it forms a soft dough. Mix in pecans. Chill dough overnight. Roll into oneinch balls, place on cookie sheet and bake at 400F for 8 minutes, until set but not brown. Roll in powdered sugar immediately, cool on racks and roll in powdered sugar again. Store in airtight container. Makes five dozen.
