# Norton Blue Jays football season wrap up

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The 2011 Norton Community High School football team was honored by parents and fans for their very competitive season during the annual banquet sponsored by the Blue Jay Booster Club on Sunday, Dec.11 in the high school cafeteria.

Under the guidance of sixth year head coach Lucas Melvin, this year's Blue Jays had a learning year. Most of the players moved up from the junior varsity to play varsity for the first time.

Wholesale graduation from the veteran 2010 squad left lots of positions to be filled by first

Despite their lack of experience, the Norton players had lots of enthusiasm and made many good plays throughout the season.

Norton opened the 2011 season on Friday, Sept. 2 at Travis Field hosting an Ellis team who traditionally gives the Blue Jays a strong test. The start of the game looked as if this would be the case again as the Railroaders got a long return on the opening kickoff and scored on a pass play to take a 7-0 lead.

The young Norton players settled their nerves and played a tremendous game the rest of the way. The Blue Jays' harddriving, opportunistic offense ran up 316 yards of offense and the swarming defense limited Ellis to 123 total yards in a 38-7 victory!

Norton runners averaged 5.7 yards per carry; the defense had three fumble recoveries and four pass interceptions. Junior wide receiver Jacob Brooks opened the second half by returning the kickoff for a touchdown.

The Blue Jays had only two returning starters, seniors Tye Nickell, running back and defensive back and Dillon McConney, wide receiver and defensive back. Senior fullback Trey Millan made the most of his first start by rushing for 97 yards on 9 carries, an average of 10.8 yards per carry. Tailback Nickell gained 94 yards on 21 carries for a 4.5 yard average.

"Our players exceeded my expectations for the first game," said coach Melvin.

"Everyone did a good job for us. We prepared well and played

#### St. Francis

Norton kept the momentum going in their second game of the season when they traveled to St. Francis on Friday, Sept. 9 and returned with an impressive 53-8 victory.

St. Francis' only touchdown came on a 94-yard run; without that run their average per rush was 1.3 yards. Meanwhile, Norton rolled up 208 yards on the ground and 157 through the air for 365 total yards of offense.

Nickell gained 69 yards on 14 carries for a 4.9 yard average. Millan rushed for 58 yards on 7 tries for an 8.3 yard average and scored three touchdowns before coming out of the game early in the third quarter due to a leg injury.

"It was a hard-hitting game and we got banged up a little,"

With two solid wins under their belts, the Blue Jays may have been a little overconfident traveling to play also unbeaten Plainville the next Friday night, Sept.16.

The veteran Cardinals were as good as advertised and handed Norton their first defeat, by a convincing 53-13 score. Norton gained 220 yards but Plainville totaled 404 yards of offense. The Blue Jays averaged 5 yards per carry but the Cardinals gained 9.3 yards per tote.

With Millan's injury, Brooks moved from wide receiver to tailback and Nickell moved from tailback to fullback. It as a good move for Brooks, who ran for 100 yards on 15 carries for a 6.7 yard average.

"Early on we did okay on defense, then had some defensive breakdowns," said coach Melvin. "We ran the ball decent and had 133 yards rushing in the first half. Our young men played

#### Oberlin

Norton's Homecoming game was played on Friday, Sept. 23 and the Blue Jays hosted longtime rival Oberlin. Norton celebrated Homecoming with a 27-14 victory to run their record to 3-1. The margin of victory would have been higher had Oberlin not recovered four of five Norton fumbles.

The Blue Jays gained 247 yards on the ground and averaged 5.7 yards per rush. The Red Devils could manage only 69 yards rushing for a 1.8 yard average. Norton had 432 total yards of offense compared to 163 yards for Oberlin.

"Our defense played a good game," said coach Melvin. "We only punted twice but had way too many turnovers."

Brooks led Norton in rushing with 107 yards on 14 carries for a 7.6 yard average. Nickell gained 70 yards on 17 tries for a for 1700 yards in the season and 4.1 yard average.

Millan was able to rejoin the team after recovering from his early season injury and performed well at fullback. He better teams we played this gained 79 yards on 14 carries for a 5.6 yard average.

quarterback Nick Hammeke entered the game having passed averaging 243 yards passing per game.

The Blue Jay defense limited Hammeke to 134 yards passing and the Monarchs to just 94 yards rushing. Meanwhile, Norton gained 222 yards rushyards of offense.

The Blue Jays were leading and the Monarchs threatening ended up in a Monarch's arms and a fourth down pass ended in wide receiver Taylor Pfeifer's hands in the corner of the end zone for a touchdown with one minute left!

Nickell ran for 99 yards on 23 carries for a 4.3 yard average and Millan gained 86 yards on 25 totes for a 3.4 yard average.

#### **Phillipsburg**

On Thursday, Norton hosted a strong Phillipsburg eleven in the Jays' final District game and final contest of the season. The Panthers had already beaten both Goodland and Thomas More

Norton's offense responded with 30 points, which would be enough to win many games, but the defense was unable to contain the strong Panther offense, which tallied 57 points.

Even with Phillipsburg's obvious superiority, the game was close for one half. Wahlmeier's 44 yard touchdown run to start the second half cut the Panther lead to 30-20 but it was as close as Norton got.

Millan was leading rusher for Norton with 93 yards on 14 carries for a 6.6 yard average. Wahlmeier gained 58 yards on 5 tries for an 11.6 yard average and Nickell picked up 46 yards on 14 carries for a 3.3 yard aver-

"Phillipsburg was one of the year," said coach Melvin. "They were quick and their line was tough and more physical than us. We were out of place at times on defense.

"Offensively, we did okay; we played hard but obviously didn't score enough."

#### **Coach's comments**

"We started our season with a game against Ellis, who we had only beaten once in the last four years although all the games were close," coach Melvin told the large crowd following the delicious carry-in meal. "It was probably the best

opening game I have ever been a part of with no turnovers, minimal penalties and mistakes.

"Next, we went to St. Francis and had another good game.

"In our third game, we faced a tremendous Plainville team that showed us what the weight room can do for people. Then, an improved Oberlin team came to town and we had to battle to beat them.

"In the Smith Center game, our defense played hard and we hung with them for a half.

"Next we hosted Perryton, Tex., a large team which ended up making their state playoffs. We had our chances to win this game but turnovers and mistakes killed us. I was so proud of our effort; I really thought we played extremely hard. I thought after that game that we could be very good.

"We played Goodland next, however, and came out very flat and didn't make some plays we needed to. We had some costly turnovers and penalties. We lacked discipline. We could have beaten them.

"In the Thomas More Prep game, wow, we played very good defense for all but one drive and a couple of other plays. We outgained them 300 to 200 but, once again, turnovers and missed opportunities killed us. This is another game we could have won.

"In the last game against Phillipsburg we were overpowered some but we kept fighting. Even after being down 21-0, we came back and got within 10 points early in the third quarter.

"It was a hard way to finish the season but our guys never quit. Unfortunately, turnovers and mistakes cost us throughout the season.

"Our junior varsity played well and ended with a 4-3 season. Two of the losses were by 6 points or less. They improved throughout the season. Several of them played varsity on special teams. They have a lot of potential."
