Norton upsets Smith Center in MCL tourney

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It looked as if the seedings had been reversed as the No.7 seeded Norton Community High School boys basketball team upset the No.2 seeded and No.8 state ranked Smith Center quintet 65-58 on the Redmen's home court in the first round of the Mid-Continent League Basketball Tournament on Monday evening.

Shooting more accurately than they have all season and playing their usual aggressive defense, the Blue Jays jumped out to an early lead and never let up the pressure.

Norton held quarter leads of 16-12, 33-28 and 49-44 and outscored the Redmen 16-14 in the fourth quarter.

As a team, the Blue Jays swished a net-smoking 54 percent of their field goal attempts from both three-point and twopoint range. Meanwhile, the Redmen connected on a reasonable 42 percent.

Norton also outrebounded the Redmen and had more steals.

"The league is pretty balanced but we shot better tonight," said head coach Doug Reusink. "It's the best we've played offensively and the best we've shot all season.

"Our defense was good, too. We pressured the ball and got

backside help. "I'm pleased with every-

body's performance."

Senior point guard Tye Nickell led the Blue Jay shooting exhibition. He hit 3 of 5 shots

from beyond the arc for 60 percent, was a perfect 2 for 2 from two-point range and finished 5 of 7 overall for 71 percent accuracy. After hitting 1 of 2 free throws, he scored 14 points.

Shooting from closer range and also hitting 14 points was senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier who hit 5 of 11 twopoint shots for 45 percent and 4 of 12 free throws for 34 per-

Junior guard Jacob Brooks was a third Norton player who scored in double figures. He hit 2 of 4 from long range for 50 percent, 3 of 11 two-point tries for 27 percent and 5 of 15 overall for 34 percent and 12 points.

Leading scorer for Smith Center was Trevor Overmiller with 13 points, followed by Alex Hobelman with 12 and Nathan Cox

As a team, Norton hit 6 of 11 from beyond the arc for 55 percent, 19 of 35 two-point shots for 54 percent and 25 of 46 overall for 54 percent.

Smith Center swished 8 of 13 long range shots for 62 percent, 14 of 39 two-point tries for 36 percent and 22 of 52 overall for 42 percent.

From the free throw line, the Jays hit 9 of 25 for 36 percent and the Redmen swished 6 of 10 for 60 percent.

Norton had 5 offensive and 27 defensive rebounds for 32 total. Smith Center collected 8 offensive caroms and 18 defensive for 26 total.

Wahlmeier led Norton in rebounding with 10, followed by Dalton Miller, 7; Brooks, 5; Dillon McConney, 4; Nickell, 2; Andrew Ellis, 2; Carson McKenna, 1; Zach Hartwell, 1.

Norton lost to Phillipsburg on the same Chuck Newlin Gym by 27 points earlier this season but Monday's game was much closer and more contested.

Norton trailed by just 7-6 after the first quarter and led briefly in the second quarter before the Lady Panthers finished with a spurt to take a 17-11 halftime lead.

The Lady Jays came out of the locker room fired up for the third quarter and, led by senior post Erin Terrell, went on a 9-0 run to take a 20-17 lead with 5:37 remaining in the period. Phillipsburg scored their first three baskets of the second half to lead 23-20. Junior point guard Tawni Griffey tallied for the Lady Jays but the Lady Panthers matched it at the other end to put the lead at 25-22.

Terrell answered with a basket for Norton and was fouled in the process. She missed the free throw but the Lady Jays trailed by just 25-24. Three more Lady Panther baskets extended the Phillipsburg lead to 31-24 with one quarter remaining. Terrell scored 8 of Norton's 13 points in the third period.


