Lady Jays defeat Plainville in league action

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Kevin Jilka's Norton Community High School girls basketball team overcame a second quarter cold shooting spell and left the nets smoking from three-point land in a 48-30 Mid-Continent League victory on Tuesday night in Plainville.

The Lady Jays' defense allowed Plainville just 2 baskets in a first quarter which ended with Norton leading 14-4 but Norton scored only 5 points and Plainville tallied 11 in the second period to narrow the Lady Jay lead to 19-15 at halftime.

It was a different story in the second half where Norton outscored Plainville 14-8 in the third period and 15-7 in the final stanza.

Baskets from beyond the arc were the highlight for Norton as the Lady Jays swished 8 of 13 for 62 percent accuracy. Junior point guard Tawni Griffey led the way with a perfect 4 of 4 from long range. She added 2 of 3 from two-point land for 67 percent and was 6 of 7 overall for a sharpshooting 86 percent! Tawni also hit 1 of 1 free throws for 17 total points.

Sophomore guard Katelyn Engelbert was also accurate from beyond the arc. She buried 3 of 5 long range shots for 60 percent. She added 2 of 9 twopoint attempts for 22 percent and was 5 of 14 overall for 36 percent and 13 points.

Junior guard Kamilla Jones completed the three-point barrage with 1 of 4 from long range for 25 percent She also hit 1 of 1 from two-point land and was 2 of 5 overall for 40 percent and

Senior post Erin Terrell was the third Norton player who scored in double figures. She hit 5 of 9 two-point shots for 56 percent and was 1 of 2 from the charity stripe for a total of 11 points.

Other than the three-point shooting, coach Jilka was not that happy with the way his girls played. "It was a win," he said. "We didn't execute very well. We did a lot of standing around.

"Defense kept us in the game. We rebounded decently for us and the three point baskets helped We had just played three games last week in the league tournament and to play again on Tuesday on the road was tough but you have to always be ready to play. It's a win and we'll take

"We're 5 and 5 now and it's our third win in a row so our girls are gaining some confi-

As noted, Norton hit 8 of 13 long range shots for 62 percent. The Lady Jays also swished 11 of 28 two-point shots for 39 percent and were 19 of 41 overall for 42 percent. The Lady Cardinals scored on 2 of 8 from beyond the arc for 25 percent and hit the exact same number

Eight different Norton girls grabbed at least one rebound. Engelbert was the leader with 8, followed by Terrell, 3; Caren Thomson, 3; Teslee Nickell, 2; Jones, 2; Griffey, 1; Bailey Ambrosier, 1; Alec Melvin, 1.

Jones had 2 of Norton's 5 steals, followed by Engelbert, Nickell and Terrell, 1 each.

The Lady Jays had 15 offensive assists compared to 6 for the Lady Cardinals. Engelbert led with 5 assists, followed by Griffey, 4; Jones, 2; Nickell, Terrell, Melvin, Thomson, 1
