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Protect your children from burns

During National Burn Awareness Week (Feb. 5-11), Safe Kids Kansas reminds parents and caregivers that fire is just one cause of burn injuries -children can also be seriously injured by hot foods and beverages, heating appliances, hot pots and pans, electrical currents and chemicals.

Scald burns, caused by hot liquids or steam, are more common types of burn-related injuries among young children, compared to contact burns, caused by direct contact with fire, which is more prevalent among older children. A child exposed to 140-degree Fahrenheit liquid for five seconds will sustain a third-degree burn.

Safe Kids Kansas urges caregivers to:

-Reduce water temperature. Set your hot water heater to 120 degrees Fahrenheit.

-Prevent spills. If possible, cook with pots and pans on back burners and turn handles away from the front. Don't place containers of hot food or liquid near the edge of a counter or table

and remove tablecloths. Establish a "kid-free zone.

-Keep electrical cords out of reach -- especially extension cords and cords connected to heating appliances such as coffee pots and deep fryers. Make sure electrical cords can't be pulled or snagged into a bathtub or sink. Don't leave a hot iron sitting on an ironing board unattended.

-Childproof your home. Cover open electrical outlets so chil-

dren can't insert metal objects into outlets, which can cause electrical burns.

-Actively supervise. Simply being in the same room with a child is not necessarily supervising. Safety precautions are important, but there is no substitute for active supervision.

"Tom filled our office with humor," said Dana Paxton, who succeeded him as publisher in Norton. "He made me laugh every single day. On our trips to meetings our conversations centered around family more so than work. His family meant the world to him."

Dreiling hired Paxton to work for him as a sales representative before he retired. Paxton said she wished he had lived closer in retirement so she could have gone to him for help.
